

Bulgars Add More Victories to Their Colors Turks Howled Down Before Fury of Allies

SULTAN LOSES ALL SUPPLIES SENT TO ARMY

Enemies Also Capture Large Quantities of Arms and Military Munitions

secretary, who afterward had an audience with the king at Buckingham palace. The news from other parts of the theater of operations show that the Turks everywhere are retreating before the victorious allies. The Turkish army, defeated in Kumanova, appears demoralized and has evacuated Kuprili and is retiring on Monastir.

A dispatch from Constantinople tonight reports that Manoud Shekiet Pasha has been appointed chief of the commissariat department of the war office. The acceptance of this appointment is considered as showing a spirit of remarkable self-abnegation on the part of a distinguished officer, as the post, though important, scarcely corresponds to his high rank and previous services.

It appears to confirm current reports of the deplorable condition of the Turkish commissariat.

A dispatch from Rome to the Post says the Montenegrin flag flies at the summit of Tarabosh and that the fall of Scutari is imminent. This is not confirmed from other sources.

A Cetinje dispatch to the Standard says the commander in Scutari returned no answer to the summons to surrender and that the Montenegrins are bombarding Tarabosh.

The Serbian legation announces that a hundred Arnaut villages in the vicinity of Uskup have surrendered. Great festivities are being held throughout the conquered country.

That section of the Turkish army which was defeated at Kumanova appears to have been entirely broken up. The Turks from Istip are making Vales the objective point of their retreat. Prior to the occupation of Istip by the Serbians, the inhabitants arose against the Turks and seized their arms.

OBJECTIVE OF CAMPAIGN
The town of Bunarhisar, says a Sofia dispatch to the Times, will form a point in the outer line of Bulgarian positions surrounding Adrianople which will be drawn through Demotica and Ortaokol—an enveloping movement that would isolate Abdullah Pasha's army or compel it to retreat to the westward.

Meanwhile, the Rhodope army, under General Kovatcheff, advancing by way of Novorokop down the valley of the river Mesta Karus, will approach the railroad line farther west. A third army is reported to have reached Istip, although this is not officially confirmed, and is expected to join the Serbian army and advance toward Monastir.

FLOODS IMPEDE MOVEMENTS
An important decision remains to be taken regarding Adrianople. The troops investing the town are encountering great difficulties from the surrounding country is inundated as a result of heavy rains. The floods also impede the military movements of the Turks and their transport of provisions into the town.

Further developments largely depend upon Abdullah's plans and a pitched battle seems in prospect, but the general movements of the Turks have been much hampered by repulses on the right wing. The Bulgarians have to decide whether, in view of the effect produced on the Turkish troops and on the Turks by the fall of Kirk-Kilise, the psychological moment has not arrived to attempt to storm the fortress.

CORRESPONDENTS "BOTTLED UP"
The Daily Mail correspondent sends the following from Tcherli: "The Saturday night we encamped here. We see the troops arriving and departing in long processions, and are allowed to take photographs whatever of the progress of the fighting. We are forbidden to leave camp and are held at the absolute disposal of the military authorities who brought us here from Solider. Abdullah Pasha has been executed and his staff are said to be here, but we have not seen them."

A dispatch from Sofia to the Mail says the Bulgarian detachment after destroying the railway for some distance around Esli-Baba, withdrew to that village. Adrianople is surrounded and its fall almost immediately is considered certain.

ROUMANIA WILL STAY NEUTRAL
BUCHAREST, Roumania, Oct. 28.—The cabinet has decided that the circumstances do not warrant the mobilization of the Roumanian army.

The king, addressing the ministers, said that the existing situation would impose upon Roumania "the duty of arriving at important decisions."

The king's speech is interpreted as indicating that in the event of Turkey's defeat Roumania would insist upon being consulted in any redistribution of Turkish dominions.

UNCLE SAM TO UNLEASH NEW WAR DOG TOMORROW
Taft to Witness Launching of the New York

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Final touches are being put to the preparations for the launching Wednesday of the latest superdreadnought to be added to the United States navy, the 23,000-ton battleship New York. Miss Kathleen Fitzgerald, daughter of Congressman Fitzgerald, and little Miss Calder, daughter of another congressman, will smash a bottle of wine on its prow as the great sea fighter slips down the greased ways.

President Taft and Secretary of the Navy Meyer will be present, the navy yard will be decked with flags and bunting and thousands from New York city have been invited to the launching ceremonies.

Naval Constructor Robert M. Stoker will have charge of the valve that will release the hydraulic steel triggers which will lift the immense hull from the solid to the sliding ways. This is a new method of launching.

BULGARS BREAK BACK OF WAR

SOPIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 28.—The Bulgarian forces, according to advices received tonight, have captured the towns of Lule Burgas and Demotica. It is reported also that the Turks are constructing earthworks along the River Erkene, west of Esli-Baba.

It is stated that Bulgarian cavalry has succeeded in cutting communications between Adrianople and Constantinople and between Adrianople and Macedonia.

The bridge over the Tchorlu river in Cherkesskoj has been blown up. It is understood that citizens leaving Adrianople are permitted to pass through the lines to the south.

The Turkish commander in Adrianople has been summoned formally to surrender the town.

A second military train from Constantinople, loaded with flour, has fallen into the hands of the Bulgarians in Esli-Baba.

BULGARIANS CUT OFF ADRIANOPLE

VIENNA, Austria, Oct. 28.—The bridge across the Tchorlu river was blown up by the Bulgarians yesterday, thus interrupting communication between Lule Burgas and Constantinople, according to a dispatch from the correspondent of the Reichspost, with the headquarters of the second Bulgarian army.

The correspondent adds that the Bulgarians are making steady progress against the Turkish field army.

The strength of the Turkish troops around Adrianople is estimated at four army corps, he said at 150,000 men fought near Kirk-Kilise.

Part of the Turkish troops garrisoning Adrianople managed to retreat to Demotica, 25 miles to the south. The rest of the garrison is cut off and demoralized by heavy losses. During the last sortie by the Turkish troops one regiment surrendered to the Bulgarians.

A dispatch to the same paper from Scutari says a Montenegrin flying corps captured the town of Scutari and is expected to join the Serbian army and advance toward Monastir.

DECISIVE FRAY EXPECTED SOON

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 28.—The minister of war, Nazim Pasha, who has reached the scene of operations in the east, telegraphed today that he was well satisfied with the position of the Turkish forces and expected a decisive battle soon.

The minister says the Bulgarian army sustained such severe losses in the battle of October 25 that it was unable to reform and resume the offensive. On the other hand, he adds, the Turkish forces since that date have gained in strength and numbers and await confidently the Bulgarian attack.

It is announced that Hilmi Bey, who commanded a division at Kirk-Kilise and is credited with inflicting heavy losses on the Bulgarians, has been promoted to brigadier general.

Martial law is being rigorously enforced. Nobody is allowed out after 10 o'clock at night.

The minister of the interior has issued a circular censuring the administrative officials in the war zone for abandoning their posts, thus increasing the panic of the populace instead of striving to tranquilize them.

The cabinet crisis has been averted and the grand vizier has decided to retain his office.

Former Sultan Abdul Hamid arrived here late tonight and was lodged in the palace on the Bosphorus. His son, Prince Abdul Salim, who was on the staff of Prince Aziz, also arrived today. He was wounded in the fighting at Kirk-Kilise.

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More Than 1,600 Names Signed to Document Asking for State Senator's Removal

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It contained more than 1,600 names, or 300 more than the required 20 per cent.
