PEOPLE KNOW WHAT THEY WANT "The people of this country know what they want and can get it, but it must be obtained by long processes, in which the generations to come will play so large a part."

When the cheers had died away Governor Wilson stood with bared head and joined in the "Old Nassau."

At midnight Governor Wilson received a message of congratulation from President Hibben of Princeton. It was as follows:

In the name of Princeton university I extend to you the congratulations and best wishes of your alma mater upon your election to the presidency of the United States.

Mrs. Wilson and the Wilson girls were more excited over the returns than the president elect. The wife and daughters of the governor presided over the bulletin room and all the reports passed through their hands before reaching the man of the moment at Princeton.

CONGRATULATED BY WIFE As the big clock in the library of the Wilson home chimed out the hour of 10 p. m. Mrs. Woodrow Wilson placed her hands upon the shoulders of her husband and kissed him.

"My dear, I want to be the first to congratulate you," she said. The governor was standing with his hands folded and his back to the open log fire. It was the first definite word that he was the president elect of the United States.

Next to congratulate the governor were his three daughters, Miss Margaret, Beatie and Eleanor Wilson. Bubbling over with happiness, the president elect fondly embraced each of his daughters.

"Dad," said the youngest of the girls, rushing into the governor's study when the eastern jangle was told, "you are elected."

People Rule, Says Marshall INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 5.—Governor Thomas R. Marshall, democratic candidate for vice president, when assured of the success of the national ticket said: "The democratic victory of today will result in a restoration of representative government in America."

COLORADO GOES WILSONWARDS DENVER, Nov. 5.—Meager returns received up to 10:45 o'clock tonight from 378 precincts in 30 counties, including 174 in Denver, indicate that Wilson has carried the state by a substantial plurality. These reports on straight ballots give Wilson 22,801, Taft 11,506 and Roosevelt 15,557.

Figured on 457 of New Jersey's 1,772 districts indicated at 2 o'clock this morning that Wilson had carried his own state by at least 50,000 plurality. The democratic sweep of the state, they overthrew a republican majority in the state senate and elected a safe majority of the lower house, insuring the election of William Hughes (Dem.) as United States senator to succeed Frank D. Briggs (Rep.); also the election of a democrat for Doctor Wilson's unexpired term as governor.

Governor Wilson's own voting precinct at Princeton gave him 113 votes, Taft 90 and Roosevelt 55.

SPEAKER CLARK NOT SURPRISED BOWLING GREEN, Mo., Nov. 5.—To congratulate Wilson and I congratulate the country," Champ Clark, speaker of the house of representatives, said tonight when apprised of Governor Wilson's victory. "No sensible man has doubted the result for weeks."

DELAWARE JOINS WILSON COLUMN WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 6.—Woodrow Wilson carried Delaware by 5,000 to 10,000 plurality. The next Delaware legislature will be democratic and elects a successor to United States Senator H. A. Richardson (Rep.).

WILSON TAKES CONNECTICUT NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 5.—Connecticut, which four years ago gave President Taft a plurality of 44,000, today gave good sized majorities to Governor Woodrow Wilson for president and Governor Simon E. Fawcett, democrat, for governor. The democrats elected all five congressmen. Congressman Ebenezer J. Hill, republican, was defeated by Jeremiah Donovan. Governor Wilson's plurality is about 7,000. Governor Baldwin's plurality is about 1,000.

NEW YORK WORLD MAKES ESTIMATE [Special Dispatch to The Call] NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The World's lead says: "Wilson has more than 35 states with several others in doubt which may give him 40 or more. The meager returns indicate both a popular and electoral majority for the democratic candidate in the country at large. The returns at 11:30 p. m. indicate that Governor Wilson has carried these 16 states, which were carried by Bryan in 1908, with a total of 185 electoral votes: Alabama 12, Kentucky 13, Ne-

Centennarians' First and Last Votes

California Woman at 102 Casts Her First Ballot Pennsylvania, Also 102. At Polls for Last Time

WHITTIER, Nov. 5.—Mrs. Lydia Head Sharpless, 102 years old, cast her first vote today. Unaided, Mrs. Sharpless entered the voting booth and marked her ballot. A lifelong Quaker and an ardent prohibitionist, she abandoned that she voted the straight republican ticket.

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Nov. 5.—Anthony R. Edelberger, 102 years old, today cast his twentieth ballot for a president of the United States. He voted a straight democratic ticket. He regretfully said that it probably would be the last time he would vote.

Toward the close of the campaign he was savagely attacked by the republican newspapers and speakers. He said that all the other candidates on the progressive state ticket had been elected. In the race for governor, Lister (dem.), Hodge (prog.) and Hay (rep.) are running almost together and the result is in doubt. One hundred twenty-six precincts announced out of 1,903 in the state give Roosevelt 10,143, Wilson 6,950, Taft 5,374. For governor, 55 precincts give Lister (dem.) 1,836, Hodge (prog.) 1,893, Hay (rep.) 1,535. For governor 141 precincts out of 1,903 in the state give: Lister (Dem.) 5,539; Hay (Rep.) 4,484; Hodge (Prog.) 4,238. At democratic headquarters Lister's election is claimed by a plurality of 10,000.

SOUTH CAROLINA IS FOR WILSON COLUMBIA, S. C., Nov. 5.—Indications are that Wilson has carried South Carolina by a majority over both his principal opponents of more than 50,000.

TAFT EASILY IS VICTOR IN UTAH SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 5.—President Taft has carried Utah by a good majority over Wilson. Governor William Spry, republican, has been re-elected, and indications are that the republican congressional ticket has been successful. Ninety-six districts out of 277 gave: Taft 12,064, Wilson 9,706, Roosevelt 8,335.

WILSON VICTOR IN OLD HOME RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 5.—Governor Wilson's birthplace, Staunton, Va., gave him 632, Taft 287, Roosevelt 65. Home Town for Colonel

OYSTER BAY, Nov. 5.—Colonel Roosevelt carried Oyster Bay, his home town, by a plurality of 292 over Wilson. The vote: Roosevelt, 510; Wilson, 218; Taft, 67. The colonel's own legislative district voted: Roosevelt, 231; Wilson, 88; Taft, 28.

Debs Fails to Vote TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Nov. 5.—Eugene V. Debs, socialist nominee for president, did not vote today. Owing to his extensive campaign tour he was unable to be at home during the registration period.

NEW HAMPSHIRE LOST TO TAFT CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 6.—Returns from 190 election precincts out of 290 in New Hampshire, give Taft 19,355, Wilson 19,357, Roosevelt 10,433. In 1908 it gave Taft 31,380, Bryan 18,300.

CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 5.—Although President Taft had a great lead by the returns in New Hampshire, the margin was wiped out later, and at midnight Governor Wilson was more than 300 votes ahead. Returns from 80 towns and wards out of 290 gave Taft 6,603, Wilson 5,742, Roosevelt 3,358. The new legislature probably will be republican according to returns.

WOMEN LEADERS ARE SATISFIED [Special Dispatch to The Call] NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—While many of the suffrage leaders usually to be seen at various headquarters of the organizations in this city were still away from town returning from campaigns today, those in town expressed themselves as extremely gratified by the voting in all parts of the country. "The cause is making steady and certain progress," said Mrs. Harriet Stanton Blatch. "The voting today shows that women who have been given the ballot have not to be led to the polls. The voting in states to which suffrage amendments were presented shows eloquent gains."

"Everybody seemed to be deeply interested in the polling of the women citizens of California, Colorado and Utah. The big poll of Wyoming women was also commented on as proof of women's desire for the suffrage—the point of doubt upon which most stress was to be laid by the 'anties' of the east."

Johnston Mum on Defeat [Special Dispatch to The Call] NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Governor Johnston remained in his room at the Manhattan hotel tonight. Up to midnight he refused to make any comment on the progressive defeat. This morning he looked out the big broad window of the United States which kept him from stepping into his home town on the Pacific slope and recording his vote.

MONTANA SOLID FOR DEMOCRACY HELENA, Mont., Nov. 6.—Returns at 1 o'clock m. indicate that the democratic candidate for the presidency, the senate and congress have been elected in Montana. With 137 precincts from every part of the state heard from Wilson is given 7,526, with 5,578 for Roosevelt and 3,505 for Taft. Walsh (Dem.) for senator is leading Dixon (Rep.) by 1,200 votes, with Smith (Rep.) third.

WILSON WINNER IN OKLAHOMA OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 5.—Wilson carried Oklahoma by a majority estimated at 30,000. Senator Robert L. Owen (Rep.) fought for re-election under the Oregon plan, but was defeated by the Oregonian plan, Judge J. B. Dickerson, by a large majority.

complete Roosevelt received 644 votes, Wilson 483, Debs 144 and Chaffin 42. J. Stitt Wilson ran strong in portions of West Oakland, in Emeryville and Alameda.

Out of 95 precincts complete in Alameda county Roosevelt received 6,103 votes, Wilson 5,042 and Debs 2,460. In the same number of precincts Knowland received 6,855 votes, Wilson 5,094 and Luttrell 794.

Eighty precincts in Alameda county give annexation amendment, yes 2,552, no 5,507; race-track amendment, yes 2,507, no 5,357.

Out of 72 complete precincts in Oakland Roosevelt received 5,328 votes and Wilson 4,978; Knowland received 5,873 and Wilson 4,861.

Eighteen precincts at Berkeley give Roosevelt 1,533, Wilson 977, Debs 513. In the congressional race J. Stitt Wilson, 1,218; Knowland 862; Luttrell 145. Annexation amendment, yes 180, no 204; race-track amendment, yes 47, no 333.

Midnight returns from 25 precincts in Alameda give Wilson 2,023 and Roosevelt 1,991. The congressional vote was: Knowland 3,562, Wilson 1,619, Larkin 291. The assembly vote gave Morgenstern 2,013, Larkin 4,325, Rue 1,051.

The annexation amendment was defeated in a close vote of 1889 for and 1,884 against. E. K. Strowbridge (R) is re-elected in the thirteenth senatorial district, 16 precincts showing Strowbridge 923, Mason (D) 827, Tobey (S) 269. A. H. Beard (R) is elected from the fifteenth district.

In the thirty-fourth assembly district the fight is close between George Beck of Livermore and A. A. Rogers, incumbent, in the precincts in the west end of the district give Rogers 547, Beck 357. Beck claims the eastern end, including Pleasanton and Murray townships, 300. Rogers has a chance of losing in.

Thirty-fifth district—Alfred Morgenstern (R) wins. Thirty-sixth district—F. M. Smith, incumbent, wins. Thirty-seventh district—W. C. Clark, incumbent, wins. Thirty-eighth district—Daniel Ferguson (R) wins. Thirty-ninth district—George Fitzgerald (R) wins. Fortieth district—George Gelder (R) wins. Forty-first district—C. C. Young, incumbent, wins.

In the city of Alameda 6,564 votes were cast. That the electors of this city would vote in favor of the annexation amendment was expected, but at that the opponents of the measure put up a strong fight and the majority was but a slim one.

Out of 25 Alameda city precincts Knowland polled 1,328 votes to 895 for Wilson. Luttrell, the democratic nominee, received 85 votes. At midnight 72 precincts complete in Oakland give annexation amendment, yes 2,128, no 7,802; race-track amendment, yes 2,341, no 4,915.

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VERMONT GOES FOR PRESIDENT

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION, Vt., Nov. 5.—President Taft was the winner in Vermont today by a plurality of 324 over Colonel Roosevelt. President Taft received 22,323 and Governor Wilson 15,337.

COLONEL LEADS IN KANSAS

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 5.—Returns at midnight indicated that the progressive national ticket and the republican ticket had been victorious in Kansas. Progressive leaders claimed the state for Roosevelt by a plurality of from 10,000 to 15,000, but the returns maintained that the complete vote would place Wilson in the lead. W. R. Stubbs, rep., was leading William H. Thompson, dem., in the race for United States senator.

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The Roosevelt electors led in Oakland, Berkeley and Alameda and carried outside precincts. Out of a total of 60 precincts in Oakland, Berkeley, Alameda, Piedmont, Emeryville, San Leandro and nearby sections the Roosevelt electors received 3,185, Wilson 2,609 and Debs 1,436 votes. Roosevelt carried Berkeley by 1,900 and carried Alameda. The vote showed the republicans went strongly to Wilson.

The surprise of the campaign was the vote polled by J. Stitt Wilson, socialist candidate for congress, opposing Joseph R. Knowland, incumbent. Knowland won a heavy majority a few days preceding the election, but Wilson developed strength in all sections of the county. Knowland was returned by a majority of 8,000 or upwards. Knowland made no campaign after the primaries, when he defeated John W. Peterson, who had been placed in the field by the progressives. Out of 60 precincts Knowland received 3,347, Luttrell 347 and Wilson 2,648.

The total vote in Oakland was 41,216 or a registrar total of 45,929. The vote ran about as high in other portions of the county. Fifty-seven precincts in Oakland give Roosevelt 2,688, Wilson 2,837, Knowland (Rep.) 4,084, Wilson (Soc.) 3,266, Luttrell (Dem.) 442. Fifty-seven precincts in Oakland give: Annexation amendment—Yes, 2,883; no, 5,487. Race-track amendment—Yes, 2,550; no, 2,351. Ten precincts in Berkeley give: Roosevelt 751, Wilson 549, Debs 201, Chaffin 42. Annexation amendment—Yes, 54; no, 107. Race-track amendment—Yes, 26; no, 131. On the annexation amendment the vote stood in Alameda 957 for and 948 against.

In the precincts outside of Oakland, Berkeley and Alameda Roosevelt was closely pressed by the Wilson electors. Out of 11 scattered precincts as far south as Palomares, Roosevelt polled 462, Wilson 450 and Debs, the socialist, 147, and Chaffin, the candidate on the prohibition ticket, received 17 votes.

In these 11 precincts Knowland was given 571, Wilson 370 and Luttrell 73. In the contests for superior judge, Douglas (Rep.) received 611 votes, Ogden (Rep.) 84, Mudgett (Dem.) 21 and Royce (Soc.) 131. The vote on the annexation amendment stood 271 for and 595 against, and on the race-track amendment 474 for and 478 against.
