

# HUSBAND ADMITS HE THREW GOLD

## Denies That It Was Lime and Also Contradicts Other Allegations

Technically the divorce complaint of Mrs. Saddle Van Heekeren of 186 Twelfth avenue was all wrong, according to the answer of the husband, August Van Heekeren, filed yesterday. Mrs. Van Heekeren alleged that her husband hurled a can of chloride of lime at her one day while angry. The husband says it was not lime, but a \$10 gold piece, and that Mrs. Van Heekeren spent the money. Also the husband denies that he threw a table through the front doorway of their home while vexed; it was a chair. Also he says that he did not disturb the peace of his wife, he only was arrested for disturbing the peace.

Trial by deposition of the divorce complaint of Nema I. Davis, actress, playing at the Haymarket in Chicago, against her husband, George F. Davis, actor, began yesterday with the presentation of the wife's affidavit. A corroborating affidavit was filed by Mrs. Ellen Catto of Los Angeles. The wife charges that wine and women took her husband's salary of \$60 a week and that he deserted her after failing to provide for her support. The husband's affidavit will mark the closing of the case. Legal residence gives Mrs. Davis the right to sue here, although neither party to the suit are in San Francisco.

# AFFIDAVITS SET FORTH SISTERS' DIFFERENCES

## Mrs. R. E. Wall Denies That Money Was Given to Attorney Cochrane

OAKLAND, Nov. 25.—Mrs. Ruth Ewing Wall of Alameda and her sister, Mrs. Mary F. Wilson, have carried their differences to a point where their opposing statements are made in affidavits. Mrs. Wilson started Superior Judge T. W. Harris last week with an affidavit charging Attorney James W. Cochrane of San Francisco with demanding \$100 to keep the filing of Mrs. Wall's divorce action a secret and also to insure success in the trial before Judge Harris. Mrs. Wilson said that she pawned a turpentine ring, set with diamonds, for \$75 and added \$25 of her own money to give to Cochrane. In an affidavit filed today Mrs. Wall said that she gave her sister the ring to pawn, but that her sister retained \$25 and gave her only \$40. Mrs. Wall alleged her sister used the \$35 to get some goods out of storage which had been held for charges.

That Mrs. Wilson entertained a deep spite against Cochrane was Mrs. Wall's explanation of her sister's statements. A few days before the hearing Mrs. Wall said that Mrs. Wilson told her that "she would leave no stone unturned to ruin Cochrane and put him out of business." Mrs. Wall asked, "What can you do?" and was told, "Well, money can do a whole lot, and the Wilsons have money." The affidavit strongly denied Mrs. Wilson's statement that the money was given to Cochrane.

Mrs. Wall's affidavit was supplemented by one filed by Cochrane, who denied every detail of the charges. He said that Mrs. Wilson turned against him when he refused to attempt to persuade Mrs. Wall to give her a half interest in the Wall home in Alameda. Mrs. Wilson called on him repeatedly for that purpose, he said, and exhibited "spite, ill will and malice" when he would have nothing to do with her proposal.

# GET RICH QUICK MAN QUILTS WITH 70 CENTS

## Hickey Has Small Sum When Taken From Jail to Face Creditor

The financial condition of Charles W. Hickey, which, in prosperous times, when he was running a "suit club" patronized by many women, reached \$1,000 or more a week, dwindled yesterday to 70 cents, when Magistrate Barnett conducted a legal grill to ascertain whether Hickey could satisfy a judgment for \$298. The judgment was obtained by L. Lobree, who testified recently before Judge J. M. Seawell that he sold a saloon to Hickey for \$200, being paid with an I. O. U. and that Hickey in turn sold the place for \$400 and pocketed the money.

While proving that he had no money, Hickey, who had been brought from the county jail to testify, revealed himself with his usual modesty in a light to make "get rich quick" gentlemen envious. It developed that even the \$2,000 ball Hickey put up had been hypothecated. The suit club man said he "hooked" the ball receipts at 10 per cent discount. His diamond pin was "the bunk" and his ring "worth four cents."

"Surely you saved some money when you were getting \$600 a week from the suit club," queried Barnett. "Why, \$490 a week was only pin money. I wouldn't think it anything unless I made \$1,000 a week." The court gave it up and ordered Hickey back to jail whither he had been sent by Superior Judge F. H. Dunne after having been convicted of employment agency frauds.

## REDDING SCHOOLS ARE CLOSED FOR TWO WEEKS

Redding, Nov. 25.—In order to stamp out smallpox effectually all the schools in Redding, including the Shasta county high school, were dismissed today for two weeks by the health authorities. Ten cases have developed and five houses are under quarantine. Many more cases are expected, as children who had the disease and did not know it have doubtless scattered the germs. The disease ran through a whole family. It was so mild that a physician was not called and none of the family knew they had smallpox until they were all practically over it.
