The question of bonds pending appeals is to come up after sentences are imposed. The amounts of the bonds are fixed by the court. Unless the prisoners are able at once to furnish the bonds they must remain in prison.

"We certainly will appeal in the case of each man," said Krum. "There are about 90 errors upon which we shall base the petition, and we are confident of an ultimate reversal."

"This trial never will be reversed, and the men will serve out the punishments imposed by the court," said United States District Attorney Miller.

The Gray stone county prison, bearing over its portal in black letters the words "Jail Entrance," was besieged today by hundreds of visitors.

The scenes among the women relatives of the prisoners clamoring to be admitted were similar to that in the courtroom Saturday, when by the verdicts about 30 wives were separated from their husbands.

Not one of the prisoners would talk about the verdicts. The only statement forthcoming from the union was issued by Secretary Joseph E. McClory, Cleveland, who, with Ed Lewis, San Francisco, an executive board member, is the only union official out of jail.

"In spite of all the trouble we have faced during the last 20 months our organization is stronger today than it ever was," declares McClory's statement to the 12,000 iron workers. "We have in our ranks an abundance of capable leaders, and our affairs will continue to be managed with the best care and ability obtainable."

CLARK TO BE SENTENCED Beside the 33 men in the county jail awaiting sentence, McManigal and Edward Clark, Cincinnati, confined in the federal building, remain to be disposed of. Clark, who pleaded guilty, probably will be sentenced with the others.

Presidential Party RETURNS FROM PANAMA Run From Colon to Key West Made by Battleships in Sixty Hours

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 29.—President and Mrs. Taft, Colonel, and Mrs. Goethals and a number of friends arrived off Key West today on the battleships Arkansas and Delaware.

The presidential party started north on a special train due in Washington Tuesday. The journey from Colon to Key West, more than 1,100 miles, was made in a little more than 60 hours, over water's troubled only by a heavy swell, and roughed by brisk trade winds.

It is practically assured that Colonel Goethals will be offered and will accept the civil governorship of the canal. He will talk over features of the administration with the president during the trip to Washington and later at the White House.

The probability of increasing the height of the breakwater guarding Colon harbor was discussed on the Arkansas and the matter may be taken up at Washington.

CONFIDENCE MAN WHO REFUSED IS ARRESTED

Colorado Leader, Changing Name and Rearing Family, to Face Old Charge

PUEBLO, COLO., Dec. 29.—Returning to the practice of the confidence game after his release from the state penitentiary of Montana, to find that it had lost its lure, then assuming another name, marrying and moving to Pueblo, determined to lead a life of honesty, only to be recognized more than a year later and arrested to answer old charges, is the story of one of the most prominent mining men in this city, who in Billings, Mont., is known as Thomas A. Prout.

Mrs. Prout, as she must be called, knowing nothing, it is said, of her husband's past, he was turned out of the house and arrested tonight she gave a scream of horror and fell in a faint. Prout was taken to the county jail.

A. H. Cope, the assistant district attorney, is said to be divulging the name Prout has been going under on account of business complications. It is known that he lives in a nice residence and is a mining stock broker and has a fine automobile.

Prout was convicted of a mining stock confidence game several years ago in Montana, the sheriff says, and sent to the penitentiary. Upon being released, he returned to his old life, working several more confidence games, according to word from Billings, and also committed grand larceny. He was taken back to jail at the time and decided to change his way of living.

With this object in view, he married and removed to Pueblo, where he has a fine home. He was taken back to Billings to answer the charges against him within a few days.

CHICAGO SEES FIRST WOMAN HORSE THIEF Arizona Woman, Stranded, Rents Nag and Starts for Home, But Is Captured.

CHICAGO, Dec. 29.—Dorothy Beason, 21 years old, of Williams, Arizona, stole a horse to get out of town rather than have her husband arrested on the streets. She got as far as Dwight, Ill., after riding since Thursday, when she was captured and sent back to answer to the charge of horse stealing.

She was taken into the new Clark street station in sombrero, divided corset riding skirt, gauntlets and spurs, while the police gathered around to see the first girl horse thief ever seen here. She admitted that she stole the horse, but says she meant to return it.
