

NEWSPAPER MEN CALLED FOR TEN DAYS BY COURT

Publisher, Managing Editor and Share Holder of Boise Capital News Sent Up for Contempt

CRITICISED ACTION BARRING ELECTORS

Owner of Stock Is Held Equally Guilty With Active Heads of Journal

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 2.—R. S. Sheridan, publisher of the Boise capital News, C. O. Broxon, managing editor, and A. R. Cruzen, a local capitalist, convicted for contempt of the Idaho supreme court, for criticising the court's decision barring the progressive candidates for presidential electors from the Idaho ballot, occupy a cell in the county jail tonight, where they will serve out a 10 days' sentence. In addition to the jail sentence imposed on the three men, they also were sentenced to pay fines of \$500 each.

COURTROOM CROWDED

The supreme courtroom was crowded this morning when the court announced its decision. The opinion written by Justice Sullivan was concurred in by Chief Justice Stewart. It upheld the inherent right of courts to punish for contempt. Justice Alkhi dissented from the opinion on the ground that the case was not pending at the time of the publication of the article in question.

PARCEL POST IS RIGHT NAME FOR NEW MAIL PLAN

Postmaster General Uses a Singular Form in Issuing Regulations for Conduct of Department

By IRA E. BENNETT (Special Dispatch to The Call) WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Is it parcels post, parcels posts, parcel post, or parcel posts? The question is answered in section 8 of the act of August 24, 1912, in which the new system is designated parcel post.

Some of the articles declared unmailable by the parcel post system are enumerated in the regulations which have been issued to postmasters. Some of these articles are: poisons of every kind; poisonous animals, insects and reptiles; explosives of every kind; inflammable materials, infernal machines and mechanical, chemical, or electrical apparatus of various kinds which may ignite or explode; disease germs and other natural or artificial articles, compositions, or materials of whatever kind which may kill, or in any way injure another or damage the mail or other property.

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GLAVIS RESIGNS

Takes This Action to Save Dismissal at Hands of Governor

Surveyor General Makes Public Inside History of Charges Filed

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 2.—Louis R. Glavis, former secretary of the state conservation commission and secretary of the water commission, who resigned both offices following the investigation and hearing before Governor Johnson on December 20 last, was employed by the Weed Lumber company and the West Side Lumber company to represent them before the United States land office at Washington, according to a declaration made today by Surveyor General W. S. Kingsbury, who brought charges against Glavis, alleging that the conservation secretary while employed by the state was working in the interest of big concerns.

Kingsbury also declared that Glavis as an employee of a representative of the corporations employed Milton T. U'ren, private secretary to Congressman William Kent, and B. Marshall to also represent them, while he at the same time employed them and they were on the payroll of the California conservation commission.

When the probe was in operation in the governor's office a letter was written to the Standish-Hickey Lumber company by Glavis offering to secure the listing of its lieu land selections out of order for \$3 an acre, was introduced. That letter forms part of the evidence against Glavis.

Glavis is said to have offered to secure for the lumber people the listing of lieu land selections of others in the state for \$2 an acre. There were other letters sent by Glavis, so it was rumored at the time the charges were made, that he had offered to do the work for \$1.50 an acre.

Washington Pleaded WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—The resignation under charges of serious improprieties of Louis R. Glavis, who first resigned his office as secretary of the state conservation commission, and then as secretary of the water commission, was announced today by the state of California, stood charged with accepting fees from lumber and other corporations to promote the land and forest claims of such companies, despite the fact that the state of California, in whose employ he was, had interested claims.

An investigation was begun inquiring into Glavis' conduct by direction of Governor Hiram Johnson, when Glavis suddenly resigned, his resignation taking effect December 31. Reports reaching Washington are to the effect that Glavis admitted having accepted fees at rates varying from \$1.25 to \$2 an acre, and then tendered his resignation, which was promptly accepted.

It is suggested that a rampant a progressive as the bull moose vice presidential candidate could not stand for Glavis, it is hardly surprising that an administration of law and order like that of Taft should have found it necessary to dismiss him. It was, it is recalled, the fathering of Glavis, and later that of Pinchot, then chief forester, that laid the foundation for the discussion in the republican party which resulted in the disastrous defeat of last November. Through the investigation of the Ballinger-Pinchot controversy, public opinion as to Glavis course was sharply divided.
