PARCEL POST AIDS GAME LAW VIOLATORS Illegal to Seize U. S. Mail Packages; Wardens Worried

What is troubling the Audubon societies and those appointed to see that the game is protected is the fact that birds, fish and animals, if not weighing more than 11 pounds, or even a wild buck, if cut into 11 pound pieces, can be shipped by parcel post as readily as a peck of oats.
