U. S. PHILIPPINE POLICY IS DR. MOSES' THEME

University of California Savant to Read Paper Before World's Historians at London Session

BERKELEY, Feb. 15.—A paper on "The Relation of the United States to the Philippine Islands" will be read by Dr. Bernard P. Moses, professor emeritus of political science of the University of California, at the third international congress of historical studies in London next April.

Professor Moses, since being emerited from the university, has been in Europe writing papers on national and international politics and investigating continental conditions. He has been assigned by President Wheeler as the delegate of the University of California, and the officers of that organization have asked him to contribute his paper on the American Philippine policy.

Ambassador Myrtle Bryce is president of the international congress.

RELIC OF BATTLESHIP MAINE TO BE UNVEILED

Spanish War Veterans in Charge of Ceremony Next Sunday

OAKLAND, Feb. 15.—Veterans of the Spanish American war will unveil a notable relic of the battleship Maine at Lakeside park Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The relic consists of the port torpedo facing of the battleship, removed when the vessel was raised and secured from the government.

A parade will be formed at Fourteenth and Franklin streets at 1:30 o'clock, and with flags flying and martial music will proceed to the park. Department Commander E. A. Forster of the Spanish War veterans will preside, and Mayor Frank K. Mott will accept the gift on behalf of Oakland.

The United States national band will furnish music at the unveiling, and Rev. J. P. McQuaide will deliver the invocation.

"The Destruction of the Maine" will be recited by M. O. Huber of Lisicum camp No. 7. Captain Ralph Faneuf will dedicate the monument. Flowers will be strewn over the monument by members of the Julia A. Martin auxiliary, No. 29, U. S. W. V., while the "Star Spangled Banner" is being played. A salute of 21 guns will be fired by Battery B.

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

HISTORY OF CALIFORNIA MUSIC SOON TO APPEAR

Mrs. Margaret Blake Alverson's Work About Ready for Circulation

OAKLAND, Feb. 15.—Mrs. Margaret Blake Alverson, the veteran singer and teacher, announced today that her book dealing with musical beginnings in the state from 1850 and giving a complete history of the art in California will be off the press within a month.

The volume is looked for eagerly by the pioneer singer's friends in all sections of the country and in Europe and by her many pupils, past and present, many of whom have risen to high places in the profession. Mrs. Alverson has been reading the final proof sheets of the book, which will contain more than 300 pages and many cuts and brief biographies of many of the early makers of music. It also will contain a list of the principal musical events which helped to make history in California.

The book will be replete with interesting stories of the early days. Mrs. Alverson believes that she was among the very first to make a bear flag. She tells in an interesting chapter of a captain of one of the river steamers waiting a flag of this kind and agreeing to pay "a \$50 slug for it."

"The next morning sister and I went to the dry goods store of Grove Knight in Stockton," Mrs. Alverson writes, "and, after getting the proper materials, we obtained information regarding the size of the flag, the bear and other details. The work began early the next day and my hands were busy hemming the sides and ends while sister drew the shape of the bear and cut it out of brown drilling. We got our quilting frame and stretched the flag
