SEATTLE VOTERS TURN DOWN BOND ISSUE PROPOSED

Bridge Over Lake Washington Canal and Market Building Go Down to Defeat

SEATTLE, March 5.—Complete returns from two-thirds of the precincts in the city show that Thomas A. Parish, Austin E. Griffiths and Charles Marble were elected councilmen in yesterday's city election, the three winners running in the order named.

The bill passed by the city council over Mayor Cotten's veto, forbidding the police to enter rooms to make arrests without first obtaining warrants, was defeated by 500 majority.

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 5.—Appropriations totaling \$12,905,000 were passed by one branch of the other of the Washington legislature today.

The senate passed a bill providing for the spending of \$1,250,000 by the counties for permanent roads; a measure appropriating \$4,000,000 for the accident fund to use in paying claims of injured workmen; a bill providing for the bonding of the state capitol land grant for \$4,000,000 to complete the capitol buildings, and an appropriation of \$75,000 for an armory at North Yakima.

The senate passed a bill appropriating \$500,000 for the Columbia river, Washington-Oregon bridge at Vancouver, Wash. The house also passed a bill appropriating \$50,000 for the Pend d'Oreille river bridge at Newport, connecting Washington and Idaho and another for \$20,000 for the Idaho-Washington bridge over the Snake river between Clarkston and Lewiston.

TACOMA, March 5.—Oscar Dana Allen, professor of metallurgy and analytical chemistry at Yale university from 1871 to 1887, is dead at his home at Ashford, near Mount Tacoma, aged 77.

MASON EXPLAINS ROAD TAX EFFECT

Expert Assures San Mateo Supervisors Pikes Will Pay for Themselves

REDWOOD CITY, March 5.—H. A. Mason, the tax and bond expert of San Francisco, explained to the supervisors and the board of officials just how the proposed \$1,250,000 will affect the taxpayer, according to the plan of progressive payments he has arranged.

The fourth year of the life of the bonds would naturally reach the maximum interest because \$30,000 of the bond issue, \$1,250,000, for the actual construction of the roads.

These roads will soon pay for themselves in increased property values. The Geary street road in San Francisco has already added more to the cost of its construction to the value of properties adjoining it.

Count Surveyor Neuman stated that the cost of maintaining the present system of roads in San Mateo county is more than \$150,000 a year exclusive of supervisors' salaries and mileage.

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COURT EXONERATES PASTOR'S ACCUSER

Rev. Mr. Carroll and Witnesses Can Not Prove Charge of Threat

Mrs. Alice Lucile Fields, accused of having made threats against the life of Rev. Hubert Carroll at the time of the battle between the two last Thursdays in fashionable St. John's Episcopal church at Ross, of which Mr. Carroll is rector, was exonerated by Judge Edgar Zook upon the failure of Rev. Mr. Carroll and his witnesses to prove the truth of the complaint.

The courtroom was crowded with spectators interested in the outcome of a scandal which has centered about Rev. Mr. Carroll and the woman who has talked freely of her alleged intimate relations with the minister since their acquaintance began several years ago.

The woman appeared calm and collected in court. In my opinion Mr. Carroll's fears for his life are without foundation.

Rev. Mr. Carroll denied positively that he had struck the woman and blackened her eye, as Mrs. Fields has said.

To controvert this evidence, Judge Zook brought the woman to the stand, testified freely as to his knowledge of the relations between his wife and Carroll.

Yes, I intend to continue to live with my wife, he said in answer to a question by the court.

Rev. Mr. Carroll delivered one of his series of lectures on Maeterlinck yesterday afternoon at the Kentfield stadium. The meeting was guarded from a possible visit by Mrs. Fields by Sheppard Eells, who remained at the entrance of the lecture room until the meeting was over.
