

MACKINAW AGAIN ON PANAMA RUN

Vessel Which Recently Hit San Pedro Breakwater Arrives Here Dollar Company Repairs the Craft and Will Continue the Schedule

The steamer Mackinaw, Captain McClements, put in yesterday morning from San Pedro fully repaired from the damage of the disaster six weeks ago, when in a fog the craft plied up on the San Pedro breakwater in trying to enter the port.

The heavy fog delayed the freighter somewhat and it took 44 hours in the trip from San Pedro. Cutter Unalga in Honolulu The new United States revenue cutter Unalga, which was the first American vessel in Turkish waters after the Balkan war began, arrived at Honolulu yesterday on the way to Puget Sound, where it will be stationed in the customs service.

Miscellaneous Notes The new Kosmos liner Kernak, Captain Peterson, is due to arrive at Honolulu Friday. This will mark the institution of Honolulu as a call port for the Kosmos line which runs steamers out of Hamburg to Puget Sound via Magellan straits. The Kernak left Liqueur February 20.

The American Hawaiian freighter Nevada was shifted to Oakland long wharf yesterday to berth for departure today for Salina Cruz with New York cargo via the Tehuantepec route.

The Toyon Kisen Kailash liner Shinjo Maru from the orient is due at 10 o'clock this morning.

The Ventura sails tomorrow for Sydney via Honolulu and Pago Pago. The Norwegian freighter Jason of the Jensen line, Captain Rustad, will depart for the west Mexican coast Wednesday.

The Matson liner Wilhelmina will depart for Honolulu Wednesday.

SHIPPING NEWS OF COAST Items of Interest to Mariners of the Pacific (Special Dispatch to the Call)

SAN PEDRO, March 9.—Pacific Navigation steamer Harvard arrived from San Diego with a large passenger and freight list.

STEAMER YALE of the same company arrived from San Diego and after taking additional passengers and freight proceeded this afternoon for San Francisco.

STEAMER CHARLES NELSON completed the discharge of 750,000 feet of lumber for the Consolidated Lumber company at Puget sound ports via San Francisco to reload.

The Pacific Coast company's steamer Santa California arrived from San Diego, took passengers and additional cargo and proceeded for San Francisco via Santa Barbara.

STEAMER SIKKION, after discharging 800,000 feet of lumber for the E. K. Wood Lumber company, cleared for Portland in ballast to reload.

STEAMER CORONADO arrived from Grays Harbor via San Francisco with passengers and freight for the West Coast Steamship company and 620,000 feet of lumber for the Southern California Lumber company and others.

STEAMER HOQUAN, after discharging 800,000 feet of lumber, cleared for Grays Harbor in ballast.

Departures today included steamer Kansas City on schedule for Portland via San Francisco with good passenger and freight list.

After having discharged 750,000 feet of lumber for wholesalers at this port and Redondo Beach, steamer Fort Bragg cleared tonight for Fort Bragg to reload, taking passengers and freight for the West Coast Steamship company at San Francisco.

On the arrival of Court Chamberlain Instantine Brun, envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary of Denmark to the United States in San Francisco Tuesday to dedicate a site for the Danish exhibit at the Panama-Pacific exposition, a series of receptions and affairs in his honor will take place.

The committee from the local Danish colony which is making special preparations for his welcome is composed of Halvor Jacobsen, chairman, Jacob Petersen, M. Holm, Viggo Konig and John Bramsen.

Assisting in the work is another committee composed of the officers of the Danish society—James Madison, president; Dr. J. Moiggaard, vice president; C. W. Hansen, treasurer; H. J. Korrell, secretary, and 17 others.

Minister Brun will be met at the station by William T. Seaton, Major Sidney A. Cloman and Lieutenant Commander David Foote Sellers of the exposition, and by Axel Norgaard, acting consul of Denmark.

Friday he will meet President Moore and other exposition officials at the exposition building, and will be taken over the exposition grounds to select a location for the Danish building.

The directors of the exposition will tender him a luncheon Saturday noon at the St. Francis hotel, and at 2:15 the party will start for the Presidio reservation.

Danish residents have obtained 40 or 50 automobiles, and these will form a parade. At the Lombard street entrance to the Presidio several Danish societies will greet the party, and Colonel Cornelius Gardener will turn out his troops in honor of the occasion.

Miss Helga Jensen, daughter of Rev. A. H. Jensen, pastor of the Danish Lutheran church, will raise the Danish flag at the close of the ceremonies.

The Danish Singing societies, Lyren of San Francisco and Brage of Oakland, will render selections.

Saturday night a reception will be tendered to the visiting minister in Scottish Rite auditorium. Besides Danish folk dances in costume there will be addresses by the minister and James Madison, president of the Danish society.

Sunday afternoon the Golden Gate park band will render special Danish music. At night the Danish colony will tender a dinner to Minister Brun at the Fairmont hotel.

PARK MUSEUM GIVEN \$1,000 DAMASCUS SWORD J. B. Schroeder, Home From World Tour, Presents Dueling Blade He Bought in Spain

One of the most valuable donations to the museum in Golden Gate park is a Damascus dueling sword presented by J. B. Schroeder, who recently returned from a trip around the world.

The weapon is gold inlaid with a hold handle elaborately engraved. It is more than 300 years old and cost \$1,000. There is only one other in existence.

So flexible and finely tempered is the steel that it is possible to bend the blade double. A magnificent scabbard encases the sword.

Schroeder, who is a Bohemian club member, saw the sword in Spain and after some difficulty was allowed to purchase it.
