SUEY SING TONG KILLS PEACEFUL BING KONG MAN

Soo Yut, Aged 40, Is Shot by Highbinders as He Enters Room in the Chinese Quarter

WAR ON FOR KEEPS, ASSERT CELESTIALS

More Killings Expected, Not Only Here, but in Outside Cities and Towns

The fourth murder in the Bing Kong-Suey Sing tong war was committed last night, when Soo Yut, a porter, was shot down in cold blood in his room, 1129 Stockton street, by three Suey Sing highbinders.

The long war is beyond settlement. Three Bing Kongs have been killed, the fourth murder, in Fresno, being a mistake. According to Chinese high-binder ethics, three Suey Sings must be slain. An unverified rumor was received in Chinatown last night that two more murders had been committed after 9 o'clock in some interior city.

Soo Yut, 40 years of age, was a peaceful member of the Bing Kong Free Masons. He was a porter in the commission district and did not associate with the highbinders. Returning from his work he was followed last night by three highbinders. Just as he entered his room they fired on him. Smokeless powder was used.

JOHN GORDON DIED OF A BROKEN HEART

Daughter Says Son of Napoleon Grieved Himself Into Grave Following Plunge on Market

OAKLAND, March 12.—The last days of Napoleon Bonaparte and his youngest son, John Gordon of San Francisco, who lies buried in Laurel Hill cemetery, San Francisco, were parallel in their paths, according to Mrs. Susan de Lancy of Oakland, one of Gordon's daughters.

Mrs. de Lancy said today that the Corsican exile's last child died of a broken heart after having wasted \$500,000 in the stock market.

After having lost his own money in stock gambling Gordon went through, during his last days, with \$500,000, the gift of the late Darius Ogden Mills, pioneer California financier and banker, who, according to Mrs. de Lancy, was one of Gordon's closest friends.

"Mr. Mills was father's closest friend," said Mrs. de Lancy. "My father really died of grief. When he failed in his business Mills made good his losses with a gift of nearly half a million, with the admonition that he was not to use it for stock gambling."

"Father couldn't resist the temptation and the entire amount went into the market through inflated mining stocks. The realization of this is really what brought his death, as it preyed heavily on his mind."
