With Right Arm Shattered, Chinese of 75 Draws Gun With Left and Shoots Enemy in Heart

## TONG WAR FEUDS IN OAKLAND YESTERDAY

OAKLAND, March 13.—Tong war feuds which have resulted in four recent murders in San Francisco had their echoes at San Lorenzo today with the result that Tong Ding is dead and Ah Get is at the county infirmary with a shattered right arm. The shooting occurred on the bridge directly in front of the hotel there and was witnessed by dozens.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—President Wilson began today his campaign for the support of progressive republicans in the new congress. He arranged to consult with Senator La Follette at the White House tomorrow night, when legislative policies, including tariff and conservation measures, will be discussed.

The president will consult freely the progressive republican group in congress and endeavor to obtain their aid in pushing through progressive legislation.

While the advice of the progressive republicans is to be sought with respect to legislation, the president may lend a ready ear to the recommendations which they may make for appointments.

## CONN MAY LOSE LEG SHATTERED BY PISTOL BALL

Burglar Continues to Reveal to Police the Location of His Plunder in Pawn

Owen D. Conn, the "\$100,000 burglar," who now lies in the city and county hospital with a shattered leg, the effect of a bullet, will have the limb amputated before many days and may die before he discloses the hiding place of all his loot, although he revealed to the police yesterday the location of some of the plunder in various pawn shops.

The whereabouts of his woman companion, said to be Mrs. Kate Pope, sister of Lucius E. Wilson, president of a motor car company of Detroit, has not been discovered, although she left here for the east February 26.

It is evident that she is not the same person as the Mrs. Mabel Clarkson who left her husband, Rev. Nestor K. Clarkson, and her children to live with the burglar. Conn turned over to the police today a letter from Mrs. Clarkson, dated March 5, Milwaukee, and signed "Mabel Ott," reproaching him with having deserted her, and asking that he send her some money, even as little as \$10, as she was in a destitute condition.

## Woman's Board of Exposition Elects Officers

Constantine Brun, Danish minister to the United States, arrived in San Francisco yesterday afternoon to select and dedicate a site for Denmark's national exhibit at the exposition.

Minister Brun took apartments at the St. Francis, where he will remain during this week's visit in the city. Danish societies of California will be largely represented at the dedication ceremonies tomorrow afternoon.

"At present I can not say what my country will exhibit at your great exposition," said Minister Brun, who was much fatigued from his long journey.

A delegation comprising Axel Nordgaard, acting consul for Denmark in San Francisco; William T. Seaton, Major Sidney A. Goman and members of the Danish colony met Minister Brun at the Oakland mole. He will be extensively entertained during his stay here.

Minister Brun will be taken over the exposition site today. He will locate a site which will be dedicated on Saturday.

The Danish flag is to be raised on the exposition site on Saturday by Miss Helga Jensen, daughter of Rev. A. H. Jensen of this city. She will be dressed in Danish costume.

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## PRINCETON UNIVERSITY INHERITS LARGE SUM

San Francisco Salvation Army Also Included for \$50,000 in Wills of Late Millionaire

NEW YORK, March 13.—Princeton university is bequeathed the largest part of the residuary estate of the late Ferris S. Thompson, grandson of John T. Thompson, founder of the Chase National bank of this city, according to the terms of the will, and the Salvation Army of San Francisco gets \$50,000.

Ferris S. Thompson died in Paris, France, February 18. His estate is estimated at \$3,000,000.

The will specifies bequests amounting to \$732,000. These include 1,000 shares of Chase National bank stock outright and \$10,000 annually during the life of the decedent's widow to Princeton, in addition to the gift of the residue of the estate after her death, with the exception of \$200,000 to the Mercy Hospital and Orphan asylum in Chicago. This institution also receives \$100,000 outright.

## CITY TO BENEFIT FROM EXPOSITION PUBLICITY

San Francisco's Development Will Follow Closing of Fair in 1915

San Francisco will receive an entirely different and more substantial result from the Panama-Pacific international exposition than Chicago got in 1893, according to S. W. Straus, the Chicago financier. Mr. Straus, who has been in California several weeks, has thoroughly investigated the exposition conditions.

"A world's fair gives to a city a world's vision," he said. "As a means of advertising it is unequalled. It is a proof of the city's greatness and of the enterprise, push and business acumen of its citizens."

"In Chicago before 1893 everybody was trying to get rich by buying lots, and as a result, after the fair Chicago woke up to the fact that there is no value except solid real value. The spirit of speculation in the American people is now practically dead."
