COFFROTH SIGNS BIG FELLOWS UP

Bout Will Take Place on May 17 at the Eighth Street Arena

One of the best athletic attractions in the heavy weight line has been landed by Promoter Jim Coffroth of the Shasta club. He has landed Gunboat Smith and Jess Willard, the cowboy fighter, for a 20 round match, which will be staged at the Eighth street arena on the afternoon of May 17.

Coffroth had a talk with the managers of both fighters yesterday and came to terms with them. Willard and Smith are acting for Willard and Jim Buckley for Smith, listened to a proposition which the local promoter had to offer and accepted it.

The match is to box 20 rounds, and the coming encounter is one of the most important bouts between big men that has been staged in this section in many a day. Smith and Willard are two of the most talked of heavy weights in the game and, excepting Luther McCarty, they appear to be the best of the white men.

Willard has been in this city for several weeks. He recently underwent an operation on his nose, from which he is now recovering. Willard is now anxious to get into the ring to show the people of the west what he can do in the ring. He has never appeared in a pugilistic encounter here, but he realizes that it is his place to make a reputation and he is anxious to box in this city.

In view of Smith's recent ring performances, he must be taken seriously as a contender for the heavy weight championship. His quick defeat of Bombardier Wells put him right in the running for a match with McCarty, who has won most of his matches by knockouts, and he has shown performances as being the best of the white heavy weights.

There is little to choose between Willard and Smith as far as their reputations go. The former has performed in a creditable manner and is deserving of a chance to meet Luther McCarty. The same may be said of Smith. Since Willard has been in this city under the management of Jim Buckley many months ago, the Gunboat has displayed wonderfully improved form. He has won most of his matches by knockouts, and he has cleaned up the heavy weight division, with the exception of McCarty and Willard. As the colored heavy weights are under the ban, they are not considered.

Smith is now in New York, but Buckley will wire him today to leave for the coast as soon as possible. Buckley plans to remain in the until after the Smith-Willard fight.

Tom Jones figures on a trip to the mountains with Willard. The pair will probably leave for Harbin Springs in a day or so and spend a couple of weeks there.

M'ALLISTER-LAVIN BOUT NEXT FRIDAY

Bob McAllister will make his first professional appearance in this city next Friday night, when he will meet Paddy Lavin, the Buffalo middle weight, before the American club at Pavilion rink.

Since his decisive defeat of Willie Meehan at Oakland some weeks ago, McAllister has been the most talked of fighter California has produced since the days of Jimmy Britt. His sensational showing against Meehan won him many admirers and there are many strong judges who figure him as a comer in his class.

The Olympic club man showed himself to be an excellent boxer in his bout with Meehan. The latter, however, was a rough slugging fighter and McAllister might not show up so well against a proficient boxer.

Lavin is regarded as being one of the best 135 pounders in the ring. He is thoroughly seasoned and should prove a fit opponent for McAllister. The Buffalo fighter has met the best men of his class in the east and if McAllister can defeat him he is going to win a lot of credit for himself. Lavin is said to be as fast as well as being a good hitter.

McAllister has been in training for a week at Shannon's resort in San Rafael. He realizes the importance of the coming contest and will be in the best possible shape when he opposes the easterner. Lavin is also training and has made a good impression with the fans by his clever boxing with his sparring partners.

Promoter Hawes of the Hawthorne club has arranged a good bill for Friday night. He has matched Jimmy Howard, the Chicago middle weight, and Al Herman of Brooklyn for a four round bout. BIG LINE TO TALK OVER AMATEURISM

College Presidents Will Look Into Much Tortured Question

URBANA, Ill., April 20.—A meeting of "Big Nine" university presidents to consider and define amateurism in college athletics has been called for Friday by President Edmund J. James of the University of Illinois. They will attempt to define "amateurism" and to answer the question "is the money test the true criterion of amateurism?"

In his call, President James stated that other things to be considered are: "Can a college athlete receive remuneration and remain an amateur? Is it feasible to permit college baseball players to play for money on unofficial teams during the summer? Is the money test a convention handed down from the English aristocracy idea of a gentleman and a tradesman?"

The meeting will be unofficial and without executive powers, but a general agreement on what constitutes an amateur is expected to have a far reaching effect. It is believed it will be the first attempt to decide the question to be made by a body other than one engaged in the supervision of college athletics.
