Delegates Confirm Executive  
Committee's Selection of  
Dr. C. T. Hansen on  
Examining Body

GOVERNOR AWAITS  
NOTICE OF ACTION

Association Takes Over Entertain-  
ment of 1915 Inter-  
national Congress

OAKLAND, June 5.—Contest between  
Dr. C. A. Herrick of San Francisco, in-  
cumbent secretary to the California  
state board of dental examiners, and  
Dr. C. T. Hansen, also of San Fran-  
cisco, a candidate for the appointment,  
was fought out in the house of dele-  
gates of the California State Dental  
association this morning and resulted  
in the association approving the candi-  
dacy of Hansen. The struggle for the  
indorsement of the state association  
between the two men was a fea-  
ture of the fortieth annual session of  
the association, which concluded this  
afternoon.

Doctor Herrick's tenure expired last  
September, and at a meeting of the  
executive council of the association  
last July, at the conclusion of the 1912  
convention, the indorsement of the as-  
sociation was refused Herrick and  
given Hansen, notice of the action be-  
ing forwarded to the governor. No  
reappointment was made, and Doctor  
Herrick has continued in office, ap-  
pointment being withheld pending the  
present convention. The question was  
withdrawn until the meeting of the  
house of delegates this morning, when  
the indorsement of the executive coun-  
cil last year was approved.

DOCTOR HERRICK STARTS FIGHT  
Doctor Herrick made his stand at the  
meeting this morning, when a motion  
was made by the executive council  
to recognize the council's indorsement  
and was lost. Approval of the indorse-  
ment was then placed and won by Doc-  
tor Hansen. His will is forwarded to  
Governor Johnson at once.

Another contest rocked the conven-  
tion at the final general meeting this  
afternoon on the question of raising a  
fund for entertainment for the Inter-  
national Dental congress in San Fran-  
cisco in 1915. Several individual den-  
tists about the bay had banded to-  
gether and undertaken the fund, and  
requested the state association to take  
over their work. Many of the dentists  
strenuously objected, but the move was  
put through.

OFFICERS ARE CHOSEN

Dr. H. A. Fredrick of San Francisco  
was elected president of the association  
today by the house of delegates, and  
Dr. Walter R. Hughes was made vice  
president. Dr. E. E. Evans of Oak-  
land was re-elected secretary and edi-  
tor, and Dr. E. C. Best of San Fran-  
cisco was chosen again as treasurer.  
Those forming the new executive coun-  
cil include Dr. E. H. Benwick of Sacra-  
mento, Dr. T. Sydney Smith of Palo  
Alto, Dr. George A. Hodges of Turlock,  
Dr. S. T. Corwin of Oakland, and two  
holders, Dr. Sherman W. Hall of  
Berkeley and Dr. W. A. L. Knowles of  
San Francisco. The appointment of the  
delegate from the state association was  
referred to the new president. A num-  
ber of clinics were held this morning  
and this afternoon two papers were  
read. The business of the convention  
concluded with installation of officers.

OAKLAND TO INSTALL  
NEW ACCOUNTING PLAN

Council Appropriates Money to Be Used  
in Trip of Royal Oaks to  
Portland

OAKLAND, June 5.—An invitation to  
examine the new accounting system,  
based on the Metz system, which is to  
be installed in all municipal depart-  
ments, was issued to the city council  
today by a representative of the Klink  
Bean company, expert accountants, who  
have been authorized to make the in-  
novation. With the council's approval,  
the work of installation will begin  
without delay. The new system will  
result in a uniformity of accounts.

CARRIED GUN BECAUSE  
THREATENED WITH HARM

Striking Pacific Gas and Electric Man  
Declares Strikebreaker Said He  
Would Kidnap Him

OAKLAND, June 5.—T. A. Cline, a  
striking employe of the Pacific Gas and  
Electric company, pleaded guilty before  
Police Judge Mortimer Smith today to  
carrying concealed weapons, with an  
excuse that J. G. Crockett, an em-  
ploye of the company since the strike  
was called, threatened to kidnap him.  
Crockett, with the charge, was ac-  
cused by E. S. Hurley of assault with  
a deadly weapon following an alleged  
attack upon Cline by the trio.  
Cline was given probation for 90  
days by Judge Smith.

JOHNSON COMPLETES  
GETTYSBURG COMMISSION

Gettysville and Placerville Veterans  
Will Push Plans to Take Old  
Soldiers to Battlefield

SACRAMENTO, June 5.—Governor  
Johnson today completed the Gettys-  
burg celebration commission by nam-  
ing Dr. W. W. Russell, of Marysville,  
past commander of the G. A. R. for the  
department of California and Nevada,  
and S. G. Beach of Placerville. They  
will serve on the commission with  
George W. Ficks of Sacramento. The  
commission will immediately frame  
plans for carrying out of the provi-  
sions contained in the bill appropri-  
ating \$15,000 to transport veterans from  
California to the battlefield of Gettys-  
burg, June 23.

BE SUMMER GUEST


Miss Janet Painter An-
