Flying at Rate of 75 Miles an Hour, Machines Meet on "Death Curve" and Natalai Sutliff, Joseph Souza and W. Hoffert Are Killed

VICTIMS THROWN THIRTY FEET IN AIR Scene of Tragedy One of the Worst Spots for Cyclists and Automobiles in State—Scores of Enthusiasts of Sport Cut Trips Short

OAKLAND, June 15.—The lives of a young girl and two young men were snuffed out this afternoon when two motorcycles, each flying at a rate of 75 miles an hour, met in a crashing head-on collision on "Death curve" on the Pothill boulevard, near Hunter's Inn. The victims are:

NATALAI SUTLIFF, 19 years old, a telephone operator, living at 322 Oak street.

JOSEPH SOUZA, 21 years old, a teamster living at 1314 East Fifteenth street.

WESTLEY HOFFERT, 20 years old, a janitor living at 787 Twentieth street.

KILLED ALMOST INSTANTLY

The tragedy brought to a close a day of pleasure planned by a group of motorcycle enthusiasts. Souza and Miss Sutliff were riding tandem on one machine and were coming to Oakland around the curve from Hayward. Hoffert was riding alone on his machine and was bound out the boulevard road. The machines were both going at an excessive racing speed and met with a crash head on. The riders were thrown 30 feet in the air. The machines were reduced to a mass of wreckage.

GOING AT RACING SPEED

Hoffert had just started on a pleasure ride to Hayward. According to witnesses, both machines were going at a racing speed over the smooth boulevard, making at least 75 miles an hour. Apparently neither driver took the trouble to reduce speed at the dangerous crook in the road. At the apex of the curve the machines met, both drivers making futile twelfth hour efforts to avoid a collision.

REGARDED AS CAREFUL

Souza was employed as a driver by the Sunset Lumber company. He lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Souza, at 1714 East Fifteenth street. He and Miss Sutliff frequently together on pleasure trips through the hills.

WARNING NOT HEEDED

Hoffert worked as a janitor with the Oakland Furniture company and lived with his widowed mother at 787 Twentieth street. He had been employed by the company for four years. John M. Davis, president of the company, said today that he would take personal charge of the funeral arrangements.

HAWTHORNE PRISON WRITES BASEBALL ODE

"I took a great interest in young Hoffert," said Davis this afternoon on leaving of the tragedy, as he was a good lad. I had frequently warned him about riding the motorcycle, as I feared he would meet with just such an accident as this, but he took no heed."

ISAAC N. VAN DOREN DEAD
