

NOTE FROM JAIL
WINS HER DECREE

Mrs. Battelle Shows Letter
Protecting Baby's Name
in Divorce Suit

Cumulative evidence tending to show that Charles Thornton Battelle spent a great deal of his time in jail, aided Mrs. Evelyn Michelson Battelle, 2989 Pacific avenue, to obtain an interlocutory decree of divorce yesterday at the hands of Judge Morgan.

One of the principal bits of evidence was a letter, written by Battelle to his wife, in which he threatened to "attend" to his wife unless she changed the name of Philaetha Eleanor Battelle, their infant daughter, to Ruth Battelle, so that the child might not be named after her father.

The testimony of Mrs. Battelle was a recitation of charges made in her complaint filed May 26, in which she accused Battelle of defrauding landlords in Fresno, Oakland and San Francisco, and of obtaining money from his mother in law by presenting a fictitious telegram purporting to show that he was heir to \$340,000 from an eastern estate.

Mrs. Battelle was granted the custody of the child and \$40 a month alimony. Mrs. Elizabeth Grimes, who was given an interlocutory decree of divorce, John P. Grimes, a painter, by Judge Barber, told the court that she would forego alimony providing her husband would agree to give a business education to their daughter, Lila, 15 years old. San Francisco Enjoys Nice

San Francisco's weather was on the bargain counter yesterday. It was marked down from 90 to 66.

That is to say, Friday the thermometer of the United States weather bureau registered 90 degrees, while yesterday the highest record the instrument could make was 66. Twenty-four degrees of heat were struck off and the people enjoyed the bargain.

Prof. A. G. McAfee, district forecaster, was certain that Friday should not have been so hot as the thermometer said it was. It was all a mistake, a joke, an inadvertence, so he said. The fog, which was due for July afternoon, was mislaid, or held in abeyance and didn't follow the bill of lading, or weather forecast, which it was due to accompany.

Yesterday the delayed fog arrived, drowed over the hills and the sand dunes, percolated into the Golden Gate and draped the Presidio in a mantle of alabaster. And the thermometer was marked down to the regular July figures and mankind took its overcoat with him to the theater last night.

AGED SON OF PIONEER
FAMILY FALLS ASLEEP

Domingo Olivera, aged 93, whose father was one of the earliest Spanish settlers in California, died yesterday morning at the home of his son, M. E. Oliver, in Redwood City.

August 14, 1819, and lived in California all his life. He remembered when his mother owned the entire San Gabriel valley, now worth upward of \$10,000,000.

When a young man Olivera was employed as a spy under General Fremont and had many interesting experiences. Later he was compelled to leave the state, and on his return the family had lost all its land holdings. He often urged his children to take steps to regain their title to the property.
