

Woman Pastor Is Frank Preaches Common Sense

Rev. Ella W. Brown Says Woman's Work Is Family Life

Mrs. Ella W. Brown, first woman pastor in Berkeley

BERKELEY, July 20.—"No woman is making the best use of her opportunities when she seeks knowledge without the main view of devoting it to improving the condition of the less fortunate of her sex. Our colleges are filled with women who are there chiefly to acquire what they term culture. There is a great need for unselfish, educated women who will help others to better themselves and their families.

"That is the belief of Mrs. Ella W. Brown, pastor of Bethany Congregational church, who has just been called from Fairmont college at Wichita, Kan., where she was head of the English department. Mrs. Brown is the first woman minister to occupy a pastorate in Berkeley.

"I am in thorough sympathy with the efforts of women to establish themselves in professions," she explained, "for I have been in three myself. But I believe that for those who do not care for professional life there is a large field in assisting other women to make better homes.

ACT AS HOUSEKEEPERS

"More and more in recent years I have come to feel that women in a position to do so should spend a portion of their time in training themselves for family life by acting as housekeepers in schools and colleges. I was in charge of a dormitory in which I had a group of 20 boys to care for. While there I was impressed with the opportunity for women to train themselves in such a way.

"Every woman also should be able to dispense with a maid when she has a family not larger than four. So many of the women who complain about the general condition of their homes take care of their households without help. If those women had prepared themselves for the management of homes of their own by learning the use of modern tools and labor saving devices they would not be worrying about the question of keeping servants."

A VERSATILE WOMAN

Mrs. Brown is a graduate of Central Normal college of Danville, Ind. Following her graduation she was head of the English department of Campbell college at Holton, Kan. She received a degree in law from the Kansas state university, and afterward was for two years city attorney of Holton, Kan. In 1905 she was ordained a minister in the Congregational church and preached five years at the Iowa Congregational church. For the last five years she has been a member of the Fairmont college faculty. At that institution she organized and conducted a course in journalism. She is a member of the Hypathia club of Wichita, the pioneer women's organization of the state, and has been active in temperance work and other saving devices for woman's suffrage in Kansas last year she took a prominent part. But she is glad that she will cast her first vote in California, where she has come to make her home.

Dr. Brown's new congregation listened this evening to an interesting sermon she delivered on the subject, "The Law of Friendship." She spoke of the essentials of a profound friendship, finding their chief basis in Christianity. Next Sunday morning she is to occupy the pulpit at the Y. M. C. A. church. Her sermons at Bethany church are delivered only in the evenings. Dr. Brown and her father are residing temporarily with Rev. Mr. and Mrs. York.

THEATER SEIZED AND RECAPTURED

Two Proprietors Battle With Third Partner for Moving Picture House

OAKLAND, July 20.—Emil Kehrlin, asserting that his partners, J. T. Turner and Fred Dahken, since January 15 had appropriated all the profits, amounting to \$30,000, from a chain of six moving picture theaters operated by the three men in this city. San Jose, Stockton and Fresno, entered the Oakland Photo theater and the Lyric theater, the local houses of the chain, with a view of detaching them from the National Detective agency today, and forcibly took possession of the two playhouses, in which he owns a third interest.

Eight hours later, at 7 o'clock this evening Turner and Dahken, accompanied by 20 of their employees, made a rush on the detectives and employees of Kehrlin, who was guarding the Oakland photo theater.

Before Kehrlin's men could recover from the surprise of the attack they had been ejected from the theater and the playhouse was again in the hands of Turner and Dahken.

Clubs were freely used by the attacking force, but no one was hurt. The crowds were dispersed by the police.

At 7:45 o'clock Turner and Dahken led an attack on the Lyric theater in Broadway street, where they were met by Kehrlin and his son, Oliver, who had learned of the capture of the other playhouse, were in charge themselves and had warned their employees.

AITKEN LECTURES ON "LIFE IN OTHER WORLDS"

Professor From Lick Observatory Tells Church Audience Only Two Planets Are Possible of Habitation

BERKELEY, July 20.—R. G. Aitken of Lick observatory spoke tonight at the Epworth Methodist church on "Life in Other Worlds." A series of lectures is being given at the church by prominent educators and others and Professor Aitken's lecture was the third of the series.

Mr. Aitken said in part:
"It is a question with astronomers whether by the use of the telescope enough data ever can be had to show definitely that life exists in other worlds. Of all the planets there are only two in which the temperature and other conditions could possibly permit the existence of living matter.

"These are Venus and Mars. In the case of the former because the planet is so close to the sun that an atmosphere no telescope yet built has been able to see to the planet itself and so Mars there is so little water and so little atmosphere that it is doubtful if life exists there, or if it did that we could see it."

OAKLAND URGES VOTING OF BONDS

Only New Proposition Is for \$796,000 to Complete City Hall

OAKLAND, July 20.—The voters will decide tomorrow whether the municipal bonds will be reissued, the money to be used for the completion of the new schoolhouses, the auditorium, the waterfront improvements and the city hall.

Final meetings urging an overwhelming majority in favor of the bonds will be held tomorrow night by the West Oakland improvement club in Junction hall, Seventeenth and Peralta streets, and in St. Andrew's Episcopal church in Adeline street.

The bonds to be reissued will be in denominations of \$1,000, \$500 and \$100. Many of the bonds of the smaller denominations will be put on the market for the benefit of the small investor. Of the \$2,940,000 bonds to be voted on, \$2,144,000 were voted in the bond issues of 1909 and 1911.

The only new bonds are for \$796,000, to be used for the completion and furnishing of the new city hall.

The propositions are as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

The proposition to incur a bonded debt of the city of Oakland in the sum of \$773,684.66 with interest thereon at a rate not to exceed five and one-half (5 1/2) per cent per annum for the construction and completion of buildings for grammar and primary schools and the playhouse additions to existing school buildings and the acquisition by the city of Oakland of certain lands in and about the city of Oakland, which, in connection with the real property now owned by said city of Oakland, is necessary and convenient for the construction of said school buildings, as set forth in ordinance No. 489 N. S. of the city of Oakland.

PROPOSITION NO. 2

The proposition to incur a bonded debt of the city of Oakland in the sum of \$495,719.71 with interest thereon at a rate not to exceed five and one-half (5 1/2) per cent per annum for the construction and completion of buildings for high schools and the construction and completion of additions to existing high school buildings, as set forth in ordinance No. 489 N. S. of the city of Oakland.

PROPOSITION NO. 3

The proposition to incur a bonded debt of the city of Oakland in the sum of \$481,595.63 with interest thereon at a rate not to exceed five and one-half (5 1/2) per cent per annum, for the construction and completion of the municipal auditorium now in course of construction in the city of Oakland, as set forth in ordinance No. 489 N. S. of the city of Oakland.
