HE BECOMES: His Own Uncle. Nephew of His Wife. Brother in Law of His Mother in Law. Great-uncle of His Own Children. Step-grandfather of His Own Children.

AND SHE IS: Her Husband's Aunt. Cousin of Her Adopted Daughter. Sister in Law's Daughter in Law. Stepmother of Her Own Great-nieces. And in Case She Has Children She Will Be Their Aunt.

How would you like to be your own uncle, the nephew of your wife and the brother in law of your mother in law? H. E. Huntington, the railroad magnate of Los Angeles, made himself all of these things when he married the widow of his uncle, the late Collis P. Huntington, the other day in Paris.

He is his children's second cousin by adoption. He is also step-grandfather of his own daughter and his son because he is the husband of his sister in law's adopted mother and so is indirectly stepfather of the mother of his children.

He is the first cousin and stepfather by adoption of his first wife as well as her divorced husband's nephew. He is also her uncle by adoption, since he is the husband of her uncle's wife.

He is the uncle of his sister in law. The former Mrs. Collis P. Huntington effected almost as many changes for herself when she went to the altar with her late husband's nephew.

She is the stepmother of her own great-nieces and her great-nephew. She is also the daughter in law of her sister in law. She is her husband's aunt as well as his wife.

She is the cousin by marriage of her own adopted daughter, and should she have children of her own now she would be their great-aunt as well as their mother.

The arrival of an heir or heiress to the new house of Huntington would further complicate the already mixed relations.

Mr. Huntington would be uncle as well as father to his youngest sons and daughter. He would be the uncle and aunt of their stepbrothers and stepsisters.

HOOSIER AUTOISTS CROSS STATE LINE

Good Roads Club Delegation Meets Vanguard of Path-finding Expedition

BISHOP, July 23.—The vanguard of the party representing the Indiana Automobile Manufacturers' association on the Lincoln highway cross continent tour, a pathfinding expedition in that it probably will locate a cross continent highway, crossed the California state line this morning.

Members of the party brought with them the announcement that the worst roads they encountered were near the start of the trip—in the rugged and mountainous far west.

Seventeen cars, comprising the bulk of the party, were in the van, and two, delayed by accidents, were not far behind.

A delegation in cars from the Inyo Good Roads club welcomed the travelers at the state line, and the presence of Governor Odell of Nevada with the Hoosiers was recognized by the salute of 17 guns, achieved in this instance by the use of bombs.

The California bear flag, raised with the stars and stripes at the state line, was lowered and tendered to Carl G. Fisher as a token of the Hoosiers' possession of the state.

Another ceremony that marked the advance to the coast consisted of the erection of a metal monument at the pass through the White mountains, hereafter to be known as Westguard pass, a mark of honor for A. J. Westguard, one of the pathfinders from Indiana.

Big Pine is a town in Owens valley, and here the travelers paused for a dinner provided by Big Pine citizens.

The party proceeded tonight to a camp on Crater creek on Owens river, midway between Goldfield and Tahoe. They will see Carson tomorrow, as the mountainous country will cause them again to cross the state line.

ALLEGED PROCURER WILL BE SENT FROM COUNTRY

Governor Fawtier Says Tourists Are Wanted and Big Enterprises Are Planned

William Fawtier, the new governor of Tahiti, who left here for his South sea post yesterday on the liner Aorangi, is going to put the French possession on the map, or know the reason why.

For more than a year French government engineers have been making surveys and drawing plans for the improvement of Papeete harbor, and Governor Fawtier has been authorized to spend \$10,000,000 in carrying out the engineers' ideas.

Papeete will be an important point on the Pacific after the opening of the Panama canal and the French government is going to be ready, the governor says, to take care of all the business that comes. The resources of Tahiti will be developed.

One of the improvements that will be among the first carried out will be the establishment of a wireless station with sufficient power for communication with San Francisco. Private interests, says the governor, are preparing to erect a large modern, tourist hotel in Papeete, and inducements will be made to travelers to visit the island port.

The governor was accompanied by his wife and family and by his secretary, Clement Claissen, who was accompanied by his wife and daughter.

SAN BERNARDINO, July 23.—Mrs. Lena Pratt, an invalid, dropped dead late today when she heard that her daughter Flora figured in a "white slave" complaint against Jim Chang, a Chinese. Chang was arrested charged with contributing to the delinquency of Miss Pratt, who is 17 years old.

Captain Elliott will leave for Seattle on the steamship Northwestern Sunday en route to Washington, where he will protest against the action of the board.

SCOTT GUILTY OF SLAYING ANNAUD

Jury Returns Verdict in First Degree, Recommending Life Imprisonment

After deliberating for more than an hour the jury in the case of Walter Scott, a butcher on trial for slaying his employer, Egbert Annand, May 14, yesterday returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree, but recommended life imprisonment.

Scott, who had maintained a stolid attitude throughout the trial, showed no emotion, but later expressed himself as pleased with the verdict.

A motion for a new trial will be argued July 25. The crime of which Scott was convicted was heinous. Annand, who conducted a butcher shop at 1254 Ninth avenue, was found in the shop with his throat cut, several knife wounds in his back and the palms of his hands slashed to the bone.

Scott was arrested shortly afterward in his room. His bloody clothes were discovered in a garbage can, where he had hidden them.
