

### BILLBOARD MEN IN COMPROMISE WITH SUPERVISORS

Neither Majority Nor Minority Report of Committee Is Adopted in Entirety by Body

### VOGELSANG CARRIES SUBSTITUTE REPORT

Bread and Butter Plea of Workmen Has Weight With Officials

The billboard men won a slight victory before the board of supervisors yesterday, securing permits to main 22 of the 20 foot boards and a reconsideration of their remaining applications for approximately six miles of double deck signs.

Those who voted in favor of Supervisor Vogelsang's resolution were Supervisors Cagliari, A. J. Gallagher, Hadden, Hillmer, Hocks, Maury, McLeran, Murdoch, Nolan, Vogelsang.

The labor representatives made what they termed a "bread and butter" argument, declaring that from 40 to 100 sign painters had already been "laid off" because the upper deck boards could not be painted pending the present controversy.

Supervisor A. J. Gallagher led the union forces in their opposition to the cutting down of the high boards, and moved adoption of his minority report.

Speakers in favor of cutting down the boards to 10 feet were Adolph Uhl, representing the Downtown association; John Francis Adams of the City Beautiful convention and the Civic League of Improvement clubs.

### SAN LEONARDO MAN DIES IN RUNAWAY

Manuel Darnuel Killed and George Costa and T. Phillips Injured

BERKELEY, Aug. 18.—In a runaway at 5 o'clock this afternoon, which began on the Tunnel road opposite the home of Henry W. Taylor and ended in front of the Claremont hotel, Manuel Darnuel, a San Leandro rancher, aged 61, was killed, and George Costa and T. Phillips, also of San Leandro, received serious injuries.

The men were hauling furniture, using two heavy farm wagons, one as a trailer. At the top of the Tunnel road grade in Berkeley the brakes refused to work and the horses started on a mad gallop down the hill.

Costa's right ankle was fractured and he incurred many bruises and lacerations. He will recover.

### SENATORS PREDICT RUIN OF PLANTERS

Free Sugar Schedule of the Democrats Is Assailed in Tariff Debate

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Free sugar was the text of the tariff debate in the senate today, republican members assailing the democratic proposal to put sugar on the free list in 1916, predicting the ruin of the Louisiana cane sugar industry and the "gobbling up" of the sugar lands of Michigan.

Senator Bristow, Smith of Michigan, Sterling, Smoot, Lodge and Cummins led in the attack on the sugar schedule, which bids fair to hold the attention of the senate for several days.

Senator Lodge, who said he drafted a portion of the Cuban reciprocity treaty, declared that the pending bill would not be in conflict with the treaty.

Senator Sterling said agitation for free sugar had deterred capitalists from erecting beet sugar factories in South Dakota.

### FATHER CASEY'S FUNERAL TO BE HELD TOMORROW

Body Lying in State at St. Peter's, Where He Was Pastor 25 Years

The body of Rev. Peter S. Casey is lying in state in St. Peter's church, where he was pastor for 25 years.

Death came quickly to Father Casey Sunday afternoon after a brief illness. He was a pioneer in religious work in the Mission and although taking little part in public affairs wielded a tremendous influence among his flock.

### NEW CEMETERY DEDICATED

HAYWARD, Aug. 18.—With Bishop E. J. Hanna officiating at ceremonies in Hayward this morning in the presence of 500 visitors and members of the Hayward parish, Rev. Fathers Francis Garvey of San Leandro and John Villadomat of Hayward assisted in the ceremonies.

The board of works decided yesterday to reconstruct the portion of the terra cotta and masonry work of the new city hall. The estimated cost of the work is \$110,000.

### NORCROSS' FATE IN CONTEMPT CHARGE IN JUDGE'S HANDS

Case of Western Fuel Secretary, Who Refused to Produce Books, Is Aired in Court

The case of D. C. Norcross, secretary of the Western Fuel company, cited for contempt of court because of his refusal to testify before the federal grand jury or to produce the books of the company occupied the attention of United States District Judge Dooling yesterday.

Norcross was served with a subpoena last Thursday calling for the production of the company's books. In an affidavit read to the court by Attorney Stanley Moore, representing Norcross, Norcross declared that to produce the books would entail a suspension of the company's business.

The defense contended that the only purpose of the prosecution in wanting the books produced was to obtain evidence to be used in the trial of the indictments.

Special Prosecutor Matt I. Sullivan, replying to the defense, said the government believed that there were persons not directly connected with the Western Fuel company who were affected, men who had been bribed and were therefore connected with the conspiracy.

### FLYING SUSPECT SHOT WHILE TRYING TO ESCAPE

Robert Emmett Graham Is Winged Three Times By Corporal Brock

OAKLAND, Aug. 18.—Robert Emmett Graham, on probation for stealing automobile tires, was shot three times at 2:30 o'clock this morning by Corporal E. W. Brock at Fourteenth and Jefferson streets while resisting arrest on suspicion of having stolen a bolt of cloth he was carrying.

The first two bullets pierced the fleshy portion of each leg above the knee, while the third glanced along his head, stunning him.
