Miss Mildred Cunningham of Savannah, a life long friend of the bride, was the only attendant and gave the bride away.

Mrs. Coy has been one of the belles of Asheville society for last few seasons. She came here ostensibly to attend a party to be given in her honor by Miss Cunningham. Coy arrived yesterday and they were married immediately.

Reasons for the elopement were not given.

At Yale Coy was a wonder in several branches of athletics and was considered to have the most perfect physique of the university.

LOS ANGELES ARGENTINE MEN LEAD AMERICANS

CAMP PERRY, O., Sept. 1.—The first stage of the Argentine naval trophy match has ended with the Argentine team leading by 110 points. The aggregate score for the Argentine team is 1,147, while the United States has but 1,037.

The first stage was shot over the 300 meter range, with 10 shots for each man at kneeling, 10 shots prone, and 10 shots standing. Stanford Coach Arrives on Campus

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Sept. 1. Floyd Brown '12, the new football coach, has arrived on the campus, ready to put the Rugby wheels in motion. He succeeds George J. Prealey '07, who has coached the varsity for the last four seasons.

Prealey will aid Brown as advisory coach. Brown played four years on the Stanford varsity and is considered one of the greatest fullbacks ever developed at either of the state universities. He was a member of the All-America team which toured Australia in 1910.

Brown stated today that the football situation looked good to him, and that Stanford will be able to put a strong varsity in the field this fall.


