holds, for the boy has spent several seasons in Washington. But it does mean that young Julius spent his last Easter vacation visiting the Panama canal, and that the object of his boyish hero worship is Colonel Goethals, the man who is digging the big ditch.

KNOWS ALL ABOUT IT Young Julius is an enthusiast on the subject of the canal, and he knows more about it than the majority of men. Evidently he used his eyes and ears during his trip through the canal zone, for he can tell just how the land lies, how the great gates are constructed and what precautions have been taken to prevent accident and eliminate danger.

Yesterday at the home of his parents at 2712 Webster street, Julius delivered a stereoscopic lecture on the canal to a number of his school mates. He demonstrated that he knows his subject thoroughly and has inherited much of the ability of his father to present a matter convincingly and logically. The boy has elaborate maps of the canal zone and a relief map of the big ditch itself, which he used to illustrate his lecture.

CANAL IN BACK YARD "I think I shall construct a miniature Panama canal in the back yard," says young Julius. "I know just how the canal is being built, and I can get the machinery and tools at the 5 and 10 cent store."

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TAXICAB CHARGES MAY BE REDUCED

Taxicab rates will be cut by the supervisors this afternoon, if the ordinance recommended by the police committee is adopted. The new law provides for the establishment of a downtown hotel district in which the rates for two persons between hotels and depot stations will be 75 cents. For each additional person a charge of 25 cents will be made.

The taxicab men protest against the proposed rates as confiscatory, claiming it will put them out of business. The new charges also embrace hacks and automobiles. As the usual charge for these vehicles is \$1.50 in the district specified, the cut amounts to 75 cents. A large delegation of automobile men will appear before the supervisors for opposition to the new ordinance.

10 DEAD, 10 DYING, IN ENGLISH WRECK

DERBY, Eng., Sept. 2.—Ten persons were killed, 10 were fatally hurt and many others were injured in a rear end collision between two famous North England express trains on the Midland railroad near Aylesford today.

Both trains were en route from Carlisle to London when one overtook the other. The accident was due to a mistaken signal and fog. Several of the coaches on the forward train were telescoped and the wreckage caught fire. There were frightful scenes while the passengers were being removed. Some of the bodies taken from the debris were almost completely incinerated.

Among those fatally injured was Sir Arthur Douglas, Bart., former undersecretary for defense for New Zealand and former lieutenant in the royal navy.
