Buford to Call for Refugees

Transport Ordered by President to Bring All Americans Home

Full Complement of Men Signed

Calls to Be Made at Salina Cruz and Other West Coast Ports

The United States transport Buford has been ordered by President Wilson to proceed to the western ports of Mexico to afford transportation to all Americans in the war stricken republic, who have been urged to depart by the United States authorities.

Captain Griffin, who will be in command, and who has signed a full complement of men and officers, will sail from this port at 5 p. m. Monday.

The captain is making preparation as rapidly as possible to meet the orders issued by the president.

The commander of the Buford is ordered to take aboard all Americans who want to leave for America and give them free passage to any California port.

The action of President Wilson in ordering the Buford to prepare with all haste to sail for the Mexican coast is taken by many to indicate that the president and state department have but little hope for a change in the conditions in Mexico, or that Special Envoy John Lind, who is in Vera Cruz, will succeed in getting the Mexican government to listen to the overtures made by this country.

Many Without Money

In his message to congress recently President Wilson urged that every citizen of the United States now in Mexico get away from that country as soon as possible.

Salina Cruz Destination

In all probability the Buford on its voyage of relief will go as far south as Salina Cruz, touching Acapulco, Mazatlan, and possibly Guaymas, to take on citizens of this country who are anxious to get out of the war zone.

Word was brought by the Pacific Mail steamer City of Para last week that when the ship left Mazatlan 100 Americans were left behind, though they were clamoring to be taken away from the scenes of many atrocities.

From inland points it was asserted that double that number were leaving overland for the port of Mazatlan.

MERRIAM DIVORCE BATTLE IS RAGING ROUND LITTLE GIRL

Major Murphy Will Deny Captain's Wife Was Mysterious 'Woman in Bath'

Little Charlotte Merriam, over whose possession Captain Henry C. Merriam and his wife, Mrs. Jessie C. Merriam, Merriam is declared, will be sought covering the inner army life at Jackson barracks, New Orleans, will be the central figure in the courtroom when the divorce suit is reopened.

Major Murphy, who holds his title by virtue of his service on the staff of the governor of Louisiana, already has reiterated his denials that his relations with Mrs. Merriam at the southern post were other than the social customs of the army permit.

Depositions on file with Judge Graham, given by the post telephone operators, contain statements that Major Murphy conversed with a woman over the telephone, after being connected with the Merriam number.

One of the operators, a private soldier, stated that he overheard a woman laughingly say, "I have just stepped out of the bath."

Mrs. Merriam's lawyers deny that the "September Morning" lady was the captain's wife. So does Major Murphy and counsel for the wife expect to prove it was another woman.

WHY MUST ANSWER AT ONCE

Chief Has Only Five Days to Make Defense to Charges

With the charges filed by Mrs. Myrtle Huegel still pending against him and with the report of the police commission as to whether or not he is inefficient and incompetent still hanging in the air, Chief of Police D. A. White faced today the 18 serious charges filed against him by Attorney Thwain Michelsen yesterday.

Michelsen's charges of neglect of duty, incompetency, inefficiency and conduct unbecoming an officer must be answered by White within five days of the time a copy of the charges is served on him by the police commission.

The charges brought by Michelsen go back to the date of White's appointment as chief of police by former Mayor McCarthy. Michelsen complaining that for 18 months after his appointment to office White neglected to wear the uniform of his office, in contravention of regulations and regulations of the police department.

GAMBLING CASE CITED The chief's failure to close the Waldorf gambling club after its proprietor had been convicted in the police court and after citizens had made complaint that they had been robbed, drugged or stabbed in the resort, is one of the counts.

Another makes White's inefficiency and incompetency responsible for the series of dynamite explosions which in 1911 caused loss of life.

In a third count Michelsen revives the allegation that White was appointed to office through the influence of "Little Joe" Sullivan and Jerome Bassity, and that immediately after his appointment Michelsen revived in Chinatown, continuing ever since, except for a brief period when he was suppressed by Sergeant Layne, who was removed from Chinatown by White as soon as he had suppressed gambling.

AS TO SOCIAL CLUBS Michelsen charges that White failed to suppress the activities of the so called social clubs of the Occidental; that when Dr. A. J. Minkler asked for protection from burglars, White merely advised him to put a red dash light signal on his house; that he was grossly neglectful of his duty in failing to suppress the activities of the bunco men; that he appointed the detectives recently convicted of grafting with the bunco men; that he was rebuked by Mayor Rolph for failure to maintain regular office hours; that he has knowingly permitted the open and unlawful operation of lottery companies, and has failed to suppress the 1,500

It is further charged that White testified in the Taylor-Macphie bunco case that he was unaware of the operations of the subordinate, thereby admitting his incompetency; that he failed to suppress the south of Market places of ill repute; that his intimacy with "Little Joe" Sullivan, Jerome Bassity and "Jack" McManus is destroying the discipline and contributing to the general demoralization and disrepute of the police department.
