

FRENCH ENVOYS IN CONFERENCE WITH FAIR CHIEFS

Arrange for Exhibit Building, for Which Site Has Been Dedicated

In a whirlwind of activity which has characterized their visit since the hour of their arrival, the four French commissioners to the Panama-Pacific exposition started out again today with their usual enthusiasm to learn as much as possible about the city by the Golden Gate.

The first business attended to this morning by the commissioners was with reference to the French building on the exposition grounds, the site of which was dedicated yesterday afternoon.

A conference with the exposition directors was held at the exposition building at 10:30 o'clock.

From the exposition building, with the completion of their consultation with President Moore, the commissioners were whisked in automobiles to the Bohemian club in time for luncheon, as the guests of Raphael Weill.

Special decorations have been arranged for the occasion and the club dining room hall was decked with greenery from the hills, the tricolor flags of the foreign republic and the American stars and stripes.

This afternoon the commissioners were taken in automobiles to the various points of interest about the city.

The French residents of this city will give the commissioners a banquet at the Coliseum this evening, for which arrangements have been made to seat several hundred persons.

Tomorrow a trip is to be taken to Mount Tamalpais.

"ADMISSION DAY" RUSHES NOW ON

Advance Guard of Native Sons Invades Oakland for Celebration

Delegations of Native Sons began arriving in Oakland for the four day Admission day celebration which opens Monday. More than 200,000 visitors are expected.

Each band attached to a Native Sons or Native Daughters parlor is expected to appear at least once during the celebration and provide a full concert program, including the test pieces selected by the competition committee. The judges will visit each bandstand and after hearing the test pieces played by competing bands make their awards.

Grand Marshal Harry G. Williams announced today that the parade would start from Fourth and Market streets at 10 o'clock sharp, and that there would be no delay. The plans for the championship regatta on Lake Merritt, the eighteenth annual field and track championship meet on St. Mary's college track, the programs at Lakeside park, the fireworks displays on Lake Merritt and the many other features have been completed.

Sunday afternoon the Oakland park band, under the direction of Paul Steindorf, will play in Lakeside park. There will be competitive band concerts in the afternoon and evening, receptions at the various parlor headquarters and a grand illumination of the city at night.

Thomas Monahan, mayor of San Jose, grand president of the Native Sons, will arrive in Oakland tonight.

Auditor's Action Gives Men Wages

Police and Soldiers Patrol Johannesburg

The demonstration is a result of the recent strike on the Rand. Two hundred policemen and soldiers, all armed, will patrol the streets tonight.

CALL LAUNCHING ON MOVIE FILM TO BE SHOWN

Making and Sale of First Issue Interesting Subject for Camera

The sale of the first evening edition of the San Francisco Call, issued last Monday, forms the subject of one of the most interesting films ever shown by a moving picture company. When the first edition of the biggest evening newspaper in the west came hot off the press it made news as well as printed it, for the launching of The Evening Call constituted an event second to none of the happenings of that eventful day of importance.

This fact was recognized by the Golden Gate Weekly, a magazine expressed in terms of film feet—in other words, a moving picture record of all the important events that take place in California.

When the first issue of the new Call was about ready to come off the press, the moving picture operator was on hand with his machine, and he caught on his reel of film many interesting features. The picture shows the eager newsboys waiting in animated crowd, to grab the first bundles of papers and deliver them to the thousands of people who were waiting to see what San Francisco's biggest evening newspaper looked like. It shows the patrons reaching expectantly for the first copies, then going rapidly through the pages. It shows even the expressions of approval on the faces of those same readers when they saw what they had bought for their pennies.

The film is animated and alive all the way through and is expected to make a hit when it is released for exhibition tomorrow.

The "Golden Gate Weekly" is backed by Herbert Payne, the millionaire sportsman of Menlo Park. The Call film will play all next week in San Francisco and will then cover a circuit of 153 photo play-houses in the state.

Big Property Loss in East Coast Hurricane

NEWBERN, N. C., Sept. 6.—Communication with many towns along the coast, which was swept by a hurricane Wednesday, was re-established today and many reports of heavy property loss were received.

At Bathaven the water rose to a height of 15 feet over the high water level, and some of the buildings in the lower part of the town were almost inundated.

No lives were lost at Ocracoke and Portsmouth, but the property damage at both places was immense.

The damage here as a result of the hurricane was estimated at \$500,000.

Smelting Magnate Lands in Cornfield When Auto Bucks

A. Alper Has Narrow Escape at Ross, Machine Turning Turtle—Slight Bruises Only

A. Alper of Ross, president and principal owner of the Great Western Smelting and Refining company, narrowly escaped serious injury yesterday in an automobile accident when his machine turned turtle and hurled him a dozen feet into the air as he was going from his home to the railroad station.

As Alper was turning a sharp curve in Laurel Grove drive at Ross, the machine skidded, overturned and precipitated the occupant into a cornfield at the roadside.

His injuries were slight, amounting only to body bruises.

NEVADA BOOMING, DECLARES SPROULE

On his return from a "get acquainted" trip through Nevada, President William Sproule of the Southern Pacific is enthusiastic over the prosperous conditions and bright future in store for the silver state.

"There is more ore in sight in Nevada today than at any other time in its history, and more money is being made in the mining business than ever before. The great copper smelters of Mason valley and Steptoe valley, at the two ends of the state, are in active operation. The mills of Tonopah and Goldfield aggregate probably more ore than ever before.

"In addition to the government project on the Truckee river there is a great project at Lahontan which is a scene of great activity in the construction by the government of an immense dam which will irrigate 100,000 acres of land. The completion of this construction is set for the end of 1914."

Treasurer Orders Doors Locked When Nickel Strays Away

Counting of Geary Street Receipts Creates Great Excitement in City Office This Morning

High excitement reigned in the office of Treasurer McDougald this morning when yesterday's receipts of the Geary street road, amounting to \$1,507.65 were brought in. The money was spread out on the counter as usual and was being counted when McDougald heard the sound of coin falling upon the floor.

"Lock all the doors," cried McDougald. "No one must leave the office until we find out what the loss amounts to."

A number of persons not connected with the office were present and these joined in the search while the employees of the city road checked up their records with the money on hand. The entire office force was pressed into service to search for what McDougald thought might be several gold pieces, but after the quest had continued for 10 minutes McDougald gave a triumphant shout and held up a nickel which he found under the wash stand.

Ingleside Terraces

The Improvements That Have Already Been Made:

Grading The grading was commenced October 9, 1911, and completed on September 1, 1912. There were 302,000 yards of dirt moved—an amount greater than will be necessary to complete the Twin Peaks Tunnel.

Sewer A 3 1/2 ft. by 4 1/2 ft. reinforced concrete main sewer through the center of the tract, is entirely completed and in perfect condition. The side sewers leading into the main sewer are from 10 to 24 inches in diameter, and are all completed and in perfect condition. Total length, 48,891 feet.

Gas A 6-inch high pressure gas main 3 1/2 miles in length has been constructed to bring an abundance of gas into the district. A double system of gas mains, one on each side of the street, has been completed throughout the tract, laid between the sidewalk line and property line, so that all gas connections may be made without disturbing the street.

Water Two large mains are connected with the main supply pipe coming into the city of San Francisco, which lead water to tract. A double system of water mains, one on each side of the street, has been completed throughout the entire tract, laid between the sidewalk line and property line, so that all water connections may be made without disturbing the street.

Electric Lighting The electric lighting wires for all houses are brought in from the rear of the house, so arranged that no wires cross the streets at any place, all in perfect working condition. The electric lighting for the streets, made by an underground conduit between the sidewalk and the property line, so that no street will ever have to be torn up.

Street Paving The curbing consists of a combined curb and gutter reinforced and armored with steel on the edges, and is the best job of combined curb and gutter ever made in San Francisco. The paving between the curbs consists of a 6-inch hydraulic concrete bed, and a full 2-inch bituminous wearing top, not only fully up to the city standard specifications, but better, so that it will be accepted by the city for maintenance.

Sidewalks The sidewalks are all artificial stone laid next to the curb, 3 inches thick and of the best construction.

Trees and Parking Trees have been set out between the sidewalk and the property line, far enough from the curb so that horses can not injure them, and far enough back so as not to obstruct the light along the sidewalks. Parking between the building line and the sidewalk has been done on many of the blocks, some with grass and flowers, others with mesembryanthemum.

Amusements and Attractions A clubhouse and grounds worth some \$30,000 are already constructed and have been set aside for the use of the purchasers of residence property in the tract. One of the finest tennis courts in the city is dedicated to the use of the residents of the tract, being in demand on various occasions. A site has been set apart for a high class nickelodeon in that part of the tract to be dedicated to business purposes. On the tract is the San Francisco Golf and Country Club, one of the high class amusements, with its links just across Junipero Serra boulevard, on the Spring Valley lands. The Ingleside Terraces Club is well organized and has a meeting for entertainments twice a month.

Portals Nine massive portals at the entrances to Ingleside Terraces are nearly all completed.

Delivery Service A free delivery mail service for the residents in Ingleside Terraces is regularly maintained. Several grocery and other supply firms make daily deliveries from nearby establishments to residents in Ingleside Terraces.

Street Car Service Car No. 17, via Ellis street and 20th avenue, runs direct from Fourth and Market streets to Ingleside Terraces, under a 10 minute headway. Car No. 12, on Mission street and Ocean avenue, runs from the Ferry direct to Ingleside Terraces, under a 5 and 10 minute headway. The Twin Peaks Tunnel is now an assured fact and Ingleside Terraces will have a car line running through the tunnel, which will make the trip to the business center of San Francisco in 20 minutes' time.
