OWNER PROTECTS DOG THAT BITES

The owner of the house refused to give the brute up. He is said to be W. C. Sharpstein, 1545 Benton street.

Hicks has declared his intention of securing the animal, which under the law must be held ten days on examination. The dog sprang at the Greene boy's throat when the lad attempted to pat it. The case is the third in a few weeks. The license ordinance will go into effect this evening.

33,839,092 GROSS BAY IN ONE YEAR
