

HUERTA AND CONGRESS SPLIT

Refusal of Law Makers to Confirm Cabinet Man May Depose General

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 19.—A serious quarrel, fostered, it is asserted, by the dictatorial methods of President Huerta, has developed between the national executive and congress.

After long and heated debate the chamber of deputies refused to confirm the appointment of Eduardo Tamariz, a member of the Catholic party, as minister of public instruction. Approval of cabinet appointments by congress is necessary under the constitution. Heretofore there has been no such dissent, and the present situation establishes a precedent. The vote against confirmation of Tamariz was 103 to 20.

The Catholic party will probably control the next national election, despite efforts of Huerta to get the electoral machinery under his own domination. The Catholic party will meet Sunday and probably designate Foreign Minister Gamboa as its choice for president.

HUERTA TO QUIT, IS BELIEF

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—That Huerta is preparing to step out of the race for the Mexican presidency next month is indicated by dispatches reaching Washington within the last 12 hours.

That General Felix Diaz, if elected president, would be no more than a pawn for Huerta is taken for granted here. Huerta's present policy seems to be to surrender the place of power without surrendering the power itself and to bow to the pressure of the American government while apparently defying it before his people. As head of the army Huerta always will remain the most powerful man in Mexico while he has a man supposedly weak, like Diaz, in the presidential chair.

Boy Speeders Forbidden to Drive Without Parents

A NOVEL sentence for automobile speeders was handed out by Police Judge Samuels of Oakland today upon William Magee Jr. and Harry Magee, the two young sons of William A. Magee, a prominent rancher. Judge Samuels forbade the Magee boys to drive their automobile at all during a period of six months unless one of their parents was in the car. The judge said that he thought this would be a successful means of preventing the young men from driving their car at excessive speed, and instructed the parents of the boys to see that they drove within the limit. The Magee boys, who are 16 and 17 years of age, have been for some time burning up the dust of the Foothill boulevard and finally were arrested day before yesterday, when they were going at a rate of 40 miles an hour.

Last Cargo of Grain Leaves This Port on Board Sailing Ship

William P. Frye Sails With Barley for New York; Last of Fine Line of Yankee Clippers

The tug Dauntless took the big American ship William P. Frye to sea this morning with the first cargo of grain carried from this port for many months in a sailing vessel. Also it was probably the last cargo of grain that a Yankee clipper will ever take out through the Golden Gate. The Frye, Captain Nickerson, is bound for New York with a cargo of barley. There will be more barley to take to sea, but the Frye is the last of the American sailing ships fit to be entrusted with this kind of a cargo. When the Frye comes back to this port it will be converted to other uses and will end its days either as a tanker or a salmon carrier.

WIFE SHOOTS HUSBAND AND SELF DID SCHMIDT KILL HELEN GREEN?

Divorcee, Jealous of Another Woman, Attempts to Kill; Both Dying

ANTIOCH, Sept. 19.—Jealous with the thought that her husband would live with another woman if her divorce was granted, Mrs. Lucinda Krebs attempted to murder Aloysius Krebs and then commit suicide here early this morning. Shot through the stomach, Krebs is dying. Mrs. Krebs has a fighting chance for life, but will be paralyzed.

Following the suit for divorce filed in San Francisco, Krebs secured employment as foreman in the steel works at Pittsburg several months ago. Mrs. Krebs had named an eastern woman as correspondent. A few days ago Mrs. Krebs, at her home, 1624 O'Farrell street, San Francisco, is said to have received word that the other woman was coming to live with Krebs.

She came here Wednesday, armed with a revolver, and attempted to pick a quarrel with Krebs. He quieted her and gave her accommodations in a room at his home. Early this morning Mrs. Krebs went to his room and, after shooting him in the stomach, went down to the basement and shot herself in the breast. Constable Higelow, attracted by the shot, discovered the tragedy. Both were taken to the local hospital unconscious. Krebs is not expected to live. Mrs. Krebs' condition is serious, the bullet having entered the spine, paralyzing her lower limbs.

Girl Friend of Confessed Slayer of Anna Amuller Mysteriously Disappears

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The police today were trying to find Helen Green, girl friend of Hans Schmidt, self-confessed murderer of Anna Amuller. She met Schmidt some time last winter. Later she was frequently seen in his company by persons who recognized the photographs of Schmidt as the man well known in the night life along the "gay white way" as the "count" who represented himself as the son of noble parents.

Some time ago Miss Green disappeared after declaring that she was going to Chicago. She promised to write to several of her friends from there, but no word has ever come from her. Several letters from the girl to Schmidt were found among his effects, but all of them were written while she was still in New York. Cable dispatches today which established the fact that Schmidt and Edward A. Muret, the bogus dentist and Schmidt's partner in the counterfeiting scheme, are cousins, declared that Schmidt and Muret gave hypnotic exhibitions and spiritualistic seances in Europe.

The facts contradict Schmidt's statement that he is in no way related to Muret and that he had known "the dentist" for only ten months. It was stated today that while in Germany and other parts of Europe, Schmidt and Muret were partners in crime, but that they quarreled a short time before Schmidt came to this country. A reconciliation was brought about, however, just before Schmidt sailed for America.

For several days the police have been searching for a woman who, it is believed, was in some way involved in the crimes committed here by Schmidt and Muret. An arrest was expected today.

Refugees Wait for Free Trip on Buford

Although the Pacific Mail liner Pennsylvania, which arrived yesterday from Panama, made a special call at Manzanillo for refugees, not a passenger boarded the ship. There were refugees at the port, but they preferred to wait for the army transport Buford, on which the transportation is free.

The liner brought about 20 passengers, some of them tourists, but the majority were government employes from the canal zone. Captain Austin reports that north from the Santa Barbara channel he ran through a smoky haze that was heavily impregnated with the odor of petroleum. He decided that the hot weather was responsible for the phenomenon.

Governor Commutes Sentence of Slayer

Seven years to a day after Walter Westwood participated in the killing of Fred Mullinix, Governor Johnson commuted his life sentence in San Quentin to 20 years, so that he has now five years and four months to serve.

He was 17 years old when sentenced. His mother, Mrs. Florence Ryan of 1012 Octavia street, has fought for him for years, and is now an invalid. Governor Johnson was partly actuated by her feeble condition in his action.

Westwood and three other boys, all intoxicated, held up a man in Golden Gate park September 18, 1908, and robbed him of \$12.25. The next man they met was Fred Mullinix, and when he offered resistance one of the lads shot him through the head. They were all sentenced to life imprisonment.

THRILLS AND ACCIDENTS AT FAIR

Risky Exhibitions Threaten for Moment to Result in Fatalities

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 19.—Risky exhibitions, filled with thrills and accidents which threatened for the moment to be fatal, made yesterday's session of the state fair an exciting one. William de Kau, a mallet man in the auto polo races, was thrown from his car and injured his back. While he was being taken to the hospital Director Charles Paine of the State Agricultural society was dragged behind the ambulance for a distance of 100 feet; and a human pyramid of six cavaliers balanced on horses came down in a heap during their exhibition of trick riding.

Alameda county holds the stage today with a big excursion from the bay city, and tomorrow "San Francisco 1915 Exposition day" will be celebrated. More than 200 members of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, California Development board, San Francisco Commercial club and exposition directors will be present.

A special train will convey the San Francisco delegation, which will be accompanied by the Coast Artillery band. Leaving the ferry at 8 o'clock Saturday morning the party will arrive in Sacramento at 11:45 and will be given a luncheon at the Sacramento hotel. The Sacramento Chamber of Commerce will act as the receiving body.

Quality of the beef stock in California ranks high, and the older breeders of the middle west have no advantage over the Pacific coast stock growers, according to John T. Caine of Logan, Utah, who has been judging the beef stock exhibited at the state fair. A number of the shorthorns and Herefords were shown. Caine declared that California should raise more Angus stock, as there is a notable lack of entries in that breed.

SAN MATEO CAMPAIGN FOR BOND ISSUE OPENS

SAN MATEO, Sept. 19.—The campaign in support of the proposed municipal bond issue of \$89,899 for a city hall, central fire station and other public improvements will be opened with a public rally in the Lawrence school tonight under the auspices of the East Side club. Among the speakers will be Mayor Thomas Branson, City Attorney Charles N. Kirkbride, Engineer D. Bromfield, Joseph B. Gordon and members of the regular campaign committee. The election will be held October 14.

KYTKA INSPECTS NAMES ON REDLIGHT PETITIONS

To examine the forged signatures in the redlight abatement petitions, Theodore Kytka, handwriting expert, departed for Sacramento last night. In 10 days his report will be submitted by District Attorney Fickett to the grand jury. Assistant District Attorney Louis Ferrari is accumulating evidence to prosecute the inquiry.
