

LOW NEEDS TO TRAFFIC OFFICE, SAYS TAYLOR

Former Mayor Urges Re-election of Collector as a Very Efficient Official

HAMMERSMITH IN RACE FOR SUPERVISORSHIP

Olympic Club Man Has Hearty Support of His Fellow Members

Former Mayor Edward R. Taylor has come to the front with J. O. Low, who is seeking re-election, and expresses the hope that Low will be victorious because he believes that Mr. Low "has been an extraordinarily efficient official—one that the city, having been fortunate to secure, be wise enough to hold on to."

One of the leading members of the Olympic club, familiarly known to his friends as "Johnny" Hammersmith, has declared his candidacy for supervisor, and his fellow club members are working diligently for his success.

With two big meetings today the candidate endorsed by the union labor party will finish a week of strenuous campaigning tonight before an audience at the Empire Athletic club, 1110 Bryant street. Besides this public meeting at the Empire club many of the speakers will appear for a few minutes at some of the public dances and socials. The same message conveyed to the voters of the relief home district at noon today, concerning home industry, municipal ownership and the relief of the outlying sections of the city, will be delivered at the meeting tonight.

Hundreds of school children from every school for 10 miles about flocked to the grounds, making the record attendance up to that time. The prize for the most extensive and varied exhibit of farm products has been awarded to Mrs. Phoebe Hearst, with her exhibit from the Hacienda ranch in Pleasanton, the second being taken by the Spring Valley Water company. Other individual awards were given the Hearst ranch.

This tiny lass of eight summers has sent a collection of compositions to an eastern publishing house and in the next few months the interesting group of piano numbers which local authorities assert are of exceptional merit will be given to the public. At the present time several of her musical writings are being used in the classes of one of the music schools of the city.

When other children were conning their A B C's Elizabeth was dreaming fairy songs in sound and learning to put them in concrete form. Her ear was perfect for tone values and she could hear the names of each more easily than she could read them. She has grown up with the piano as her plaything and in her small arms is a wonderful power which is unafraid of the most trying of the old masters.

Two years ago Elizabeth Short played before the Damrosch school in New York and was accorded the honor of being perched on the great stool before the magnificent organ which was the gift of the late John Jacob Astor to the Episcopal church in Rhineback-on-the-Hudson, a signal recognition to the gifts of the 6 year old girl. When Josef Hoffmann visits the coast this winter she will be given an audience before the world famous pianist.

But with all her natural talent and the splendid gifts which set her apart from her playmates, the little pianist and composer is a charming, merry hearted child, devoted to dolls and baseball. She is taught at home with her mother for teacher and companion and Miss Cora Jenkins as her musical supervisor.

Crew of Schooner, Mourned as Dead, All Safe at Samoa

Mystery of Missing Ship Explained in Message of Wreck and Journey to Island

As a message from the dead came the news today that the crew of the schooner Americana were all alive and safe at Samoa. The message confirmed the belief that the schooner had been lost. The vessel was wrecked on the coral strand of Jarvis island in the South Pacific and is a total loss. Details of how the mariners reached the dry land, of their Robinson Crusoe existence on the little island, which lies just south of the equator, and of how they made their way to Samoa, are as yet missing.

The Americana, in command of Captain Charles Johnson, left the Columbia river March 3 for Sydney with a cargo of lumber. Today's message from Samoa is the first word received from the schooner since it passed over the bar at Astoria. The Americana was posted as missing September 17 at Loyds and the members of the crew were mourned as dead. The sailors will return to this port on one of the steamers of the Oceanic line, which make regular calls at Pago Pago, the American naval station in Samoa.


