

ROADS ARE BLOCKS S. P. TRAINS

Barricades Tracks and Sends Armed Men to Prevent Wreckers Working

Southern Pacific electrical department, says that he intends to send out a wrecking crew to remove the cars.

Chief of Police Peterson of Oakland has sent a force of extra patrolmen to the scene to prevent a riot.

The trouble has arisen over the alleged failure of the Southern Pacific to live up to an agreement by which the railroad was given the right of way through Havenscourt on the Southern Pacific's promise to concede to residents in the tract the same rates to San Francisco that are enjoyed by those boarding the trains at Melrose.

Barricades have been erected and cars of gravel dumped across the track of the Southern Pacific company in Havenscourt on the recently completed Melrose to San Leandro extension of the Southern Pacific and a force of armed men hired by the Wickham Havens corporation, owners of the tract, is on the ground to prevent the Southern Pacific from running their trains through the land.

The railroad corporation is also gathering an armed force to see that their trains are allowed to pass, and bloodshed may result in a few hours.

Chief of Police Peterson of Oakland has ordered Lieutenant Fred Schroeder to send a force of extra patrolmen to the scene to prevent a riot.

The trouble between the Havens people and the railroad has arisen over the alleged failure of the Southern Pacific to live up to the agreement.

Through this agreement they were given the right of way through Havenscourt. Harry Lelmer, who represents the Havens corporation, stated that they gave the Southern Pacific the right of way on their promise to concede to residents in the tract the same rates to San Francisco that are enjoyed by those boarding the trains at Melrose.

Lelmer says that the company is charging excessive extra rates at different points throughout the tract, at one point charging 25 cents for a trip to San Francisco. He also charges that the company is levying an excessive commutation rate.

ACCUSED POLICE MUST FACE JURY

Dunne Denies Motion by District Attorney to Dismiss Bunco Cases

Denying a motion for the dismissal of felony indictments against the four convicted policemen now serving terms in the county jail for conspiracy in the recent bunco police expose, Superior Judge Dunne this morning set the cases for trial one week from today.

Assistant District Attorney Berry interposed a motion for dismissal of the felony indictments which charged grand larceny against John Sullivan, Louis Droleite, Charles Joseph and William McHugh.

At that time, it was stated that an agreement had been reached between the counsel for the defendants and District Attorney Fickert that if they pleaded guilty, the felony charges of grand larceny would not be pressed.

James McGowan, another of the policemen on the charge, admitted his crime, in the calendar in Superior Judge Cabanias' court, and his case will come up next week when a motion is made for dismissal of the indictment.

Charles Taylor and Arthur MacPhee, policemen who were convicted and sentenced to nine months in the county jail, are now out on bail pending appeal.

Volunteers Fighting Hard to Save Girls' School From Destruction by Flames
