CHILD NAMED FOR DESERTING FATHER

Infant Son of Man Who Left Wife for Her Aunt Is Christened

Although the child's father is said by its mother to be under the spell of the man's aunt, the christening of Francis William Hall was held in the parish church at San Leandro Monday night and the 6 months old baby named after the absent father by Rev. Mr. Cros, who officiated at the request of Mrs. Arda Hall, the wife deserted five months ago.

NEW STEAMSHIP LINE IS PLANNED

Fleet of Freight Steamers to Run Between Boston and This City Through Canal

A magnificent fleet of new freight steamers owned by the Emery Steamship company and the Boston-Pacific Steamship company are to establish a new freight service between the Hub City and San Francisco upon completion of the Panama canal. Negotiations have been completed for terminal and docking facilities in San Francisco by R. C. Emery, president of the Emery Steamship company, and his two copartners, H. H. Livermore and H. D. Cleveland.

The three steamship men have been at the St. Francis for the last few days investigating the docking facilities of this port. They leave tonight for another stop at San Francisco. Freight service will be carried on by vessels of the newest type of construction and of large capacity.

7 Firemen Overcome In \$100,000 Store Fire

SAN JOSE, Oct. 22.—Damage to the extent of \$100,000 resulted from a fire in the basement of the big clock and suit house of Stull & Son, located in South First street last evening. Seven firemen, including Assistant Chief Frank H. Kerrius, and Captain Walter P. Carr, and Fire Commissioner William McCarthy, were overcome by smoke and were carried from the building. Fireman Frank Deming's condition is serious. Byron Erb, a youth, and door walkers prevented a panic among the large force of young women working in the store when the fire was discovered.

INCOMES OVER \$3,000 ARE TAXED

Beginning November 1, every person, firm or corporation having control of the payment of any fixed amount exceeding \$3,000 annually to another person shall deduct and withhold from such payment a tax of 1 per cent on all income exceeding \$3,000 a year. Such is the substance of a statement issued today by Joseph J. Scott, collector of internal revenue, explaining the new federal income tax law.

Under the head of annual gains subject to the tax are interest, rent, salaries, wages, premiums, annuities or any other annual profit or income of another person. No tax need be withheld, however, from the payment of dividends on the capital stock, or from the net earnings of corporations and joint stock companies or associations themselves required to make returns of net income to the collector of internal revenue. The exception in this case is to avoid double taxation.

Before any person, firm or corporation, including bank or banker, may undertake the collection of income on foreign investments, a license must be obtained from the internal revenue commissioner. The application for license must be accompanied by a registration of the names, addresses and nature of business of the applicant.

Urgent Deficiency Bill Signed by Wilson

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—The president today signed the urgent deficiency bill. He was in doubt at first about placing his signature on the measure, owing to the clause which provided that the collector of internal revenue shall be exempt from the civil service act, but finally decided to accept it.

DECISION OF JURY BREAKS POWERS' WILL

The late Joseph P. Powers was of unsound mind when he made a will practically disinheriting his wife and children and bequeathing his estate to a jury decision recorded today in Judge Coffey's court. The jury held that Powers was under the undue influence of his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Powers, when he left his \$30,000 net estate to his brother, Charles, and the remainder of his estate equally to his wife and mother.

NO NIGHT COURT NEEDED IN S. F., SAYS CRIST

Police Judge Wiley F. Crist, who has been investigating court conditions in eastern cities since September 12, returned to his duties this morning. Crist, before his departure, a staunch supporter of night courts for this city, but, after investigating affairs in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and St. Louis, is of the opinion that San Francisco does not need them at the present time.

EPIDEMIC KILLS DUCKS

Forty thousand ducks have died this year on Buena Vista and Tulare lakes in Kings and Kern counties. The fish and game commission is investigating the cause of the epidemic, which has prevailed five years. The commission recommends that no ducks from the flocks in these lakes be used as food.

TWO TREATED FOR RABIES

Marion Petersen, 6 year old daughter of C. L. Petersen, assistant manager of the Hotel Oakland, with her 2 year old brother James is undergoing the Pasteur treatment at the University of California as a result of an attack by a dog yesterday in which both were severely bitten.

EDUCATOR'S WIFE ILL

SAN JOSE, Oct. 22.—Mrs. M. B. Dailey, wife of the president of the San Jose state normal school, is seriously ill at the Columbia hospital in this city with typhoid fever. Before her marriage six months ago Mrs. Dailey was Miss Olive Frances Jones of the Alameda school department.
