Police Judge Plays Part of Modern Solomon When He Decides in Canine Case

Police Judge John J. Sullivan portrayed the role of a modern Solomon this morning when he gave a decision in a dog ownership case which came up for action on his calendar.

The case was Miss Mae Salisbury versus J. Quinn, a saloon keeper. The bone of contention was Maxie, a large St. Bernard dog with an affectionate nature.

After listening to both sides of the case Judge Sullivan ruled that Maxie was exhibit "A" at trial of man after he and man had spent night in jail.

VICTIM'S FACE IS HAUNTING POWER \$1,000,000 OFFER BEING CONSIDERED

Attorney Overcome With Remorse for Slaying Quinton, His Former Friend

Overcome by remorse for killing Charles Quinton, Thomas J. Power in his cell in the Alameda county jail is haunted by the face of his victim with the agony it portrayed on the night of the shooting in the Irvington saloon Saturday.

With his face blanched and his nerves unstrung after a sleepless night, Power declared this morning that he bitterly regretted that he had taken a human life.

"Words can not tell how sorry I am that I was forced to kill this man who wrecked my home," he said. "His blood is on my hands, and I can not escape the feeling of responsibility that must come to one who takes a human life. From the verdict which was rendered yesterday, I feel that my own townspeople are with me, but I have no desire to pose as a hero, for I have done a terrible thing in killing Quinton."

Apparently deserted by his wife, who, he says, caused the tragedy, Power showed signs of depondency for the first time. His wife has not signified any intention of testifying for him at the trial and has made no attempt to see him.

The woman has not been seen since Saturday night by the clerks at the Crallin hotel, Oakland, nor by her attorney, Clarence Frowell. It is believed that she is in San Francisco. A formal charge of murder was placed against Power today.

Directors of United Properties Studying Proposition Made by Hanford and Tevis

Directors of the United Properties of California, in which Frank M. (Borax) Smith is a heavy stock holder, are meeting this afternoon in the company's offices, 57 Post street. The purpose of this meeting and one held yesterday afternoon is to consider the offer of R. G. Hanford and W. S. Tevis to pay Smith \$1,000,000 for his interest in the United Properties. The offer includes the assuming of all obligations in the company of Smith.

BENNETT SAYS NOTHING

"I have nothing to say except this, which is to correct an error. Hanford's so called proposal does not provide for the payment of any sum of money in spot cash to anybody," said Louis Bennett, personal representative of F. M. Smith, this morning.

"The directors, who had the proposition submitted to them some days ago, are taking up every angle of the offer," said one of the directors today. "The source from which the finance are to come and the standing of the men who will back Hanford and Tevis, are being closely investigated. The directors will go over every detail of Smith's holdings and liabilities before they arrive at a decision. It is probable that the directors will hold many more meetings before the matter is up for final action."

"Another thing that the directors have to take into consideration is the option Hanford and Tevis have on the Smith holdings, which expires on January 1, 1914."

OPTION MAY BE OFF

Denial was made that Hanford and Tevis had supplemented their offer of \$1,000,000 in any way, or that they had agreed to consider a counter proposition from Smith.

It was said today by one in close touch with the Smith-Hanford tangle that Hanford's offer of \$1,000,000 is an indication that the option expiring January 1 is off and that Hanford is unable to swing it. The later proposition, it is declared, involves less cash than the option called for.

COOK HELD UP

Albert Smith, a restaurant cook, was held up by a lone highwayman early this morning at Drum and Jackson streets and robbed of 80 cents. The thug stopped Smith, asking him for a cigarette. As the cook passed over "the making" he found himself looking into the muzzle of a revolver.

WELL KNOWN BROKER DIES

Joseph S. Mattoon, the oldest custom broker of San Francisco, died yesterday at his residence in Belvedere. He had been in failing health for nearly a year and his death was not unexpected. Mattoon was an enthusiastic member of the Corinthian Yacht club and for many decades took a keen interest in boating around San Francisco bay.

Customs Collectors Hold First Meeting

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Collectors of customs from every port of entry in the United States are meeting for the first time in history today in the custom house to devise ways and means for checking smuggling, handling cargo and baggage under the new tariff and to promote efficiency and economy in the revenue collecting service.

The conference will last for 10 days.

WILSON DENIES THEFTS

In the arrest of James Wilson, a teamster, who was found hiding in the hay loft of D. O. Church, Mariposa and Hampshire streets, this morning, the police believe they have in custody the man who has been responsible for the systematic theft of a large quantity of empty grain sacks. Wilson, who denies that he was committing any crime when found, says he went into the loft to sleep.
