

SAVES GIRL IN DEATH RACE

Motorcyclist Speeds to Hospital, Carrying Wouldbe Suicide on Machine

Carrying the unconscious form of a woman suffering in the agony of lysol poisoning, Frank Emery, a noted racing motorcyclist, drove his machine at breakneck speed through the city streets at an early hour this morning to the central emergency hospital.

The wild ride began at the Crockett apartments, Market and Brady streets, where Mrs. Marlon Bennett took the poison in despondency over the desertion of her husband, Emery, who happened to be near by at the time, did not wait to summon an ambulance.

Later this morning Mrs. Bennett, who is a striking looking woman, had passed the danger point, but resented the action of Emery in saving her life.

Why didn't he leave me alone to die instead of bringing me to this hospital? Now I have to live when I wanted so badly to die," she sobbed.

A PATHETIC CONTRAST While Mrs. Bennett, who is not more than 23 years old, kept insisting that she wanted to die and that this world was not worth while, little Mrs. Alma Johnson, the 17 year old girl who was found in Golden Gate park yesterday morning sobbing and declaring that she wished she were dead, sat up in a bed on the other side of the ward and declared she was happy she was living.

The contrast was pathetic. Mrs. Bennett tossed on her cot. Mrs. Johnson, with her long, brown hair braided over her shoulders, sketched pictures of pretty girls and commented on the beautiful sunshine after the storm.

TROOPS WILL BREAK CAR STRIKE

Nonunion Men to Man Indianapolis Streetcars Tomorrow

BULLETIN INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 7.—The streetcar strike may be settled within 12 hours as a result of a conference of labor leaders, which lasted all this morning behind closed doors. Negotiations are reported to be well under way and if consummated the strikers will at once re-establish the service.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 7.—Streetcar service will be resumed in Indianapolis on all lines simultaneously tomorrow morning, according to plans announced today. Cars will be sent out en masse. The cars on each line will follow each other, keeping but a few feet apart. No tickets will be accepted and all cash taken in by the conductors will go to the strike breakers who man cars.

Ample protection will be supplied by three co-operating forces, comprising patrolmen, deputy sheriffs and troops who will perform police duty. Martial law will not be proclaimed unless rioting breaks out.

Troops today remained in the various armories and the newly organized staff of 1,000 deputy sheriffs had not been put into service up to noon. There were no disorders.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ACTS WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The federal government today took a hand in the Indianapolis streetcar strike situation.

State Draws Warrant For Panama-Pacific SACRAMENTO, Nov. 7.—A warrant for \$300,000 of the state's \$5,000,000 Panama-Pacific exposition fund was drawn by Controller John S. Chambers this morning. The money will be used to repay the exposition board for funds already disbursed.

MEN FIGHT FOR LIFE IN TANK

Five employees of the Pacific Gas and Electric company in Oakland were caught like rats in a trap in a huge gas cylinder in the company's plant and seriously injured at 9 o'clock this morning in a gas explosion of unknown origin.

R. C. Hughes, 2917 Laguna street. All the men were seriously burned about the face, shoulders and arms and some were injured about the eyes. Boyer and Deaham sustained the most serious injuries.

A small amount of gas was hanging in the wash box, and suddenly this gas exploded. Half blinded, burned and partially unconscious, the men were dragged from their precarious position by fellow workmen and ambulances summoned. The company's property was not damaged to a very great extent by the explosion.
