

IS SLINGSBY WOMAN IN HIDING?

Deputies With Subpenas Do Not Find Her; Wanted to Testify Today

DEPUTIES WATCHING HOME

Deputies have watched the temporary home of the Slingsbys at Fillmore and Vallejo streets for two days, and in response to inquiries have been told Mrs. Slingsby "is not at home."

Lieutenant Slingsby did not attend the hearing today. Edward M. Coffey, chief clerk of the board of health, related the circumstances surrounding the changing of the place of birth on the certificate filed with the county clerk. Mrs. Slingsby came in person to the office of the county clerk, he said, and had the place of birth changed from the office address of Doctor Fraser in Chinatown to the home of Mrs. Hattie Blain, 1532 McAllister street.

INADVERTENCE IS CLAIMED

Mrs. Lennox wanted to know whether her husband's "wires were crossed," if he had "had a blowout" or "trouble on the line" on account of his failure to reply to her letters. The mistake, she claims, contains the threat that if she did not receive an answer she would "splice up with somebody else." Lennox is a telephone cable man.

Stanford Students' Scheme to Stop Australian Tour Fizzles

The plot by Stanford university students to kidnap Rurie R. Templeton, the Stanford athlete on the All-America track team, was frustrated this morning when he was successfully smuggled aboard the steamer Tahiti, which was held in the stream until he was put aboard. The secret design to prevent Templeton taking the trip to Australia and New Zealand was hatched 10 days ago at Stanford, and steps were taken to outwit the kidnapers, with the result that Templeton is now safely on the Tahiti bound for Australia and New Zealand, as a member of the team in charge of Eustace Peikotto.

HAD WAITED FOR HOURS

A score of disappointed Stanford men left pier 12 after the Tahiti swung off. For hours they had waited for Templeton. As the hour for the vessel's sailing drew near the college men lined up and prepared to grab the athlete when he dashed for the boat at the last minute. Some of the students ran around asking if any one had seen Templeton.

In the meantime, Templeton was on a launch which he boarded at the Clay street wharf after being safely conveyed from The Call office via alleys and Clay street. The launch with the runner was a hundred yards off pier 12 while the Tahiti was making final preparations to sail. When the big steamer was in midstream the captain, by previous agreement, stopped the boat and Templeton went aboard from the launch. He waved goodbye to the disappointed group of Stanford students on the wharf.

PLACE STANFORD BEFORE U. S.

Since Templeton accepted the invitation of the Amateur Athletic union of the United States to represent his country in the invasion of the antipodes his decision has been the cause of more or less divided opinion at Stanford. There are many men high in the affairs of the campus who urged the famous athlete to take the trip, while others objected to his going away to uphold the honor and glory of the stars and stripes in preference to the cardinal colors of Stanford. The objections advanced were that Templeton would not return to the campus until the middle of March.

MORE TROUBLE ON EASTERN ROADS

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Less than two days after the board of arbitration had handed down an award in the dispute precipitated by the conductors and trainmen, the eastern railroads today found themselves involved in a new inquiry affecting 150 grievances advanced by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen. The latest inquiry, in which 52 railroads are voluntarily joined, reopens vital provisions of the arbitration award of April 23 last. This award was not a part of the new arbitration, which involved only the conductors and trainmen. In the newest hearing the firemen and enginemen express dissatisfaction over the manner in which the award of April 23 has been "interpreted," and they ask the arbitrators to render an abridgment of the arguments which followed the settlement of their demands.


DOCK WORKERS STRIKE; ALL SHIPPING CLOSES


