

THUGS FIRE AT POLICE OFFICER

Use Revolvers When He Finds Them Hiding in Doorway; Captured After Chase

Police Officer J. J. McCarty of the Fish street station narrowly escaped death early this morning when two men whom he found hiding in a doorway at Hill and Castro streets opened fire upon him with their revolvers after he ordered them to throw up their hands.

Three shots were fired point blank at the officer. Two more were fired when he pursued them in Noe street. Policemen, summoned by the shots, surrounded the district and captured Eugene Brady and John Brodie, who had fled to their homes. They have been charged with assault to murder.

While on his way home on a Castro street car shortly after 1 o'clock this morning McCarty, who was in plain clothes, was approached by Robert Biley of 630 Alvarado street. Biley, who knew McCarty, informed the policeman that he had observed two suspicious characters in the vicinity of Hill and Castro streets.

McCarty immediately left the car and began a search of the neighborhood. He found the two men crouching in a doorway.

"Throw up your hands," ordered McCarty, advancing toward the couple. With an oath one of them drew a revolver and fired three times, one bullet going through McCarty's sleeve. Warning McCarty not to follow, the men darted down Noe street. As McCarty gave chase the second man whirled about, firing twice.

Then they separated, going in different directions. Patrolmen P. J. Smith, J. Twomey and Lieutenant S. Campbell scattered through the district until they encountered McCarty. A search of the houses resulted in the arrest of Brady and Brodie. Brady lives at 482 Noe street. Brodie lives at 294 Caselli avenue.

Sues, Saying Lingerie Was Pledged, Not Sold

R. Blagden of this city, who represents 847 bond holders.

A.-H. STEAMSHIP CO. IN NEW FIELD

Virginian, Sailing Today, First to Take Freight for Direct Delivery to Eastern Ports

With the departure today of the freighter Virginian the American-Hawaiian Steamship company makes its first venture into the wider field in which it will operate after the opening of the Panama canal.

The Virginian is the first of the company's fleet to take from here freight for direct delivery to Charleston, Philadelphia and Boston.

Hitherto Pacific coast freight for these ports has been carried to New York and has paid local freight from New York to its destination. To this local freight charge was added the cost of at least two handlings.

In the case of freight to Boston the direct service will affect a saving in freight cost of from \$2.50 to \$3.75 a ton. To Philadelphia the saving will range from \$2.50 to \$4.40.

The Virginian will leave today with the largest cargo that has ever been stowed in its holds. In all there will be 10,300 tons weight or 13,500 measurement tons on board.

This cargo will be discharged into the company's cars at Salina Cruz, rushed across the isthmus of Tehuantepec, and at Puerto Mexico the Boston and Philadelphia cargo will be loaded on board the Kentuckian and the Charleston and New York cargo on the Panaman.
