

# PORT COLLECTORS MAY GET RAISE

## Davis and Wardell in Washington Recommend Pay Be Increased to \$5

If some of the recommendations submitted to the secretary of the treasury by the collectors and surveyors of customs recently in conference at Washington are carried the lot of the customs employes is going to be considerably improved. Justus S. Wardell, surveyor of the port, returned today from the conference, which he attended in company with Collector of the Port G. O. Davis.

One of the suggestions provides for an increase of 4 per cent per annum in the pay of customs inspectors until the pay amounts to \$6 a day, which will be the maximum. The minimum will be \$3. Opposition to this is expected from New York and Boston, where the pay ranges from \$4 to \$5 a day.

Collector Davis submitted a resolution, of which the conference unanimously approved, providing pensions for aged and disabled employes of the government.

Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo congratulated Davis and Wardell on the success of their anti-smuggling campaign at this port, and promised to recommend the appointment of special counsel to take charge of the prosecution of all smuggling cases.

Wardell visited New York and Philadelphia and had some enlightening conferences with department heads in Washington. Collector Davis says Wardell made a hit in Washington as an after dinner speaker. Davis will be home Thursday.

Through the efforts of Wardell and Davis it is likely that the conference of collectors and surveyors will be held in this city in 1915.

# Cemeteries 'Dead Wall,' Wants Them Removed



# PINDELL IN RUSSIAN JOB DESPITE LETTER REPUTED TO LEWIS

## Henry M. Pindell, Peoria editor, who is appointed ambassador to Russia.



### Peoria Editor Appointed to St. Petersburg Ambassadorship on Eve of Arrest of Senator's Secretary

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Henry M. Pindell, Peoria editor has been appointed ambassador to Russia, by president Wilson, as a token of reward for the support given the president during his campaign for nomination and election.

Pindell, who conducts a newspaper in Peoria is one of the wealthy men of the city. He is married and has two daughters.

Pindell has been an ardent Wilson supporter since the former president of Princeton university was mentioned for the highest office in the nation's gift.

He was entered in the race for the Russian ambassadorship through J. H. Lewis of Illinois, who was reputed to have sent a letter to Pindell asking him to take the Russian job for one year. The letter purporting to come from the senator was published and caused considerable stir in administration circles.

A former secretary of Lewis has been arrested and charged with having forged Lewis' name to it.

# DANIELS TO PASS ON VALLEJO FERRY

After a conference participated in by members of the city commission officers of the Vallejo Ferry company and representatives of the aquatic boat clubs and navy yard mechanics, Secretary of Labor Wilson announced this afternoon that he had no decision to make in the controversy between the ferry company and the boat clubs. His findings are to be presented before Secretary of the Navy Daniels for a verdict.

The conference, which was divided into 10 minute periods, was held in the office of Commandants F. N. Bennett. Among those who spoke were J. E. Godley of the Vallejo Chamber of Commerce, City Attorney O'Donnell, Captain T. Nevin of the ferry company, Attorney Morrissey of San Francisco and representatives of the navy yard mechanics and boat clubs. The mechanics said that they patronized the ferry company because it had been given permission to operate by the supreme court.

Secretary Wilson arrived at the island on the restorer Hull, which was placed at his disposal by the navy department.

The secretary returned in time to attend a luncheon in his honor at the Commercial club, after which he will be the guest of exposition officials. Tonight he will speak at a dinner given by the San Francisco center of the California Civic League at Hiale's Pompeian court. He will talk on the outlook for labor under the new federal department.

At noon tomorrow democrats of San Francisco and the bay cities will give a luncheon in honor of Mr. Wilson and Commissioner General of Immigration Caminetti at the Palace hotel. Those in charge are Louis H. Mosser and William A. Cole of San Francisco; John J. McDonald of Oakland; Thomas O'Connor of San Rafael; Joseph A. Belloni of San Jose; Alfred Mansfield of Redwood City and W. F. Pettillon of Richmond.

A handsome loving cup inscribed "To the Citizen, the Coal Miner, the Breaker Boy," was presented to Secretary Wilson by the Sailors' Union of the Pacific at a public meeting last night.

When his opponent refused the challenge to engage in flatfights with an officer, Murphy arrested him and charged him with interfering with an officer in the pursuit of his duty.

The matter will be brought to the attention of Chief White and the police commission.

# Asiatic Strike in Africa Is Spreading

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The strike of Asiatic workers in South Africa, started recently for the purpose of compelling the authorities to rescind the restrictions on immigration from Asia, is spreading rapidly. One hundred and forty thousand Asiatics in Natal, mostly Hindus, demand the removal of the race distinction in the new immigration act which prohibits immigration from one province to another, and the removal of the \$15 poll tax on Hindus in Natal.
