

Here's a Fine East Bay Sunday Menu Chef Zumbach's Idea for a Family Feast

Charles Zumbach, chef of the Hotel Oakland, offers a menu for a family Sunday dinner. He gives a list that is both economical and delicious and contains dishes most any housewife can prepare. Such a dinner can be arranged by following Zumbach's instructions.

Hotel Oakland Head Cook Tells What to Eat, How to Make It

CREAM OF BEAN SOUP—Mince 4 ounces of carrots, 2 ounces of onions and 1 ounce of celery. Fry these in 4 ounces of butter, adding 2 pounds of fresh tomatoes, cut in halves and pressed. Mashed with 2 quarts of broth and let cook for half an hour; then press the whole through a fine sieve; put this into a saucepan, adding 1 quart of cream sauce, boil, skim and when ready to serve season to taste, and if too thick add table cream and pour into tureen with a garnishing of rice blanched and cooked in consommé. Add small pieces of cooked chicken and cereale leaves.

OYSTERS, BOILED STYLE—Butter a deep dish; pour into it one dozen fresh opened oysters and their liquor; season with salt, pepper, tomato sauce and tobasco sauce; scatter over a few bits of butter, then set the dish into a HOT oven. Serve as soon as the oysters are poached—that is, firm to the touch.

LOBSTER IN SHELL, AUGUSTA—Take one raw lobster of one and a half pounds and cook it in water with one soup-spoon of vinegar, a little thyme, bay leaf, one onion, two cloves, one carrot cut in small pieces. Cook this for the half hour. Remove from the stove. Detach the tail from the body, then extract the meat from the body whole and set aside to get a firm touch. Cut the tail in three-quarters of a pound. Cut this in slices and put into a saucepan with a small piece of butter for five seconds. Add a pinch of paprika, a bit of chopped green pepper and some sliced, fresh

mushrooms. Cook the mixture for five minutes and add half pint of table cream and two tablespoons of good sherry. Let this simmer for five minutes. Then thicken with the yolks of two eggs and a small piece of sweet butter. Dress the lobster in its own shell, sprinkle with a little Parmesan cheese and place it in the oven to brown slightly.

PLANKED LAMB STEAK, OAKLAND—Cut steak about an inch and a half thick, fry in pan and then serve on plunk with sweet potatoes, duchesse. To prepare potatoes, first boil and then mash with yolk of egg; season to taste. Garnish plunk with stuffed pimientos, which are prepared by using a stuffing of chopped meat, onions and tomatoes, and covering with chopped parsley. Also garnish plunk with egg plunk, Julienne. To prepare egg plunk cut into small strips and fry in butter. Cover entire steak with Colbert sauce, brown gravy with meat glaze, lemon juice, parsley and butter.

CHICKEN SAUTÉ MADRIENE—Cut in quarters two small chickens after cleaning them well; season with salt, pepper, paprika and sweet Spanish peppers, put them into a liberal amount of saugepan and when they commence to brown add a pound of bacon cut up into quarters in small squares. Add a little chopped shallots and a suspicion of garlic, together with three good sized peeled fresh tomatoes cut in small pieces. Having previously

blanched four ounces of carrots and the same quantity of turnips cut in three-sixteenth inch squares. Blanch separately four ounces of onions, cut in one-eighth inch squares, add a small bunch of parsley, a bay leaf and a little thyme. Moisten with a little stock. Cover the pan and finish cooking in a slack oven until done. When ready to serve, thicken the sauce with the yolks of three eggs, creamed, butter and lemon juice, pour this over the chicken, trim the handle bones and serve.

SALAD CAFE CHANTANT—Take celery knob, pineapple, Pimento and apple, cut in quarter inch squares. Mix with mayonnaise and tarragon juice. Serve in a bowl garnished with lettuce leaves.

GATEAU BOUQUET—Line a round pan with a dough made as follows: Four ounces cake flour, one and a half ounces powdered sugar, two and a half ounces butter, the yolk of an egg, one tablespoonful butter; mix in ordinary cookies and place in a cellar for about one hour before using. Fill the pan with this batter. Beat three and a half ounces powdered sugar with the yolks of seven eggs and one whole egg. When light and foaming add half a teaspoonful good vanilla extract, two ounces cake flour, two ounces rice flour, two ounces melted butter and the whites of two eggs beaten to a firm froth. Bake at 350 degrees Fahrenheit. When baked and cool finish by spreading apricot jelly all over and browned chopped almonds on sides. Place six small cones in center and fill with six different flavored creams.



Lee, San Francisco dentist, who killed former Police Captain Thomas McCarthy of Los Angeles in a fight in San Francisco over a woman, has been pardoned by Governor Johnson and restored to citizenship. He has been on parole for more than a year. Lee's term would have expired January 1, 1914.

Thomas G. Flaherty, who killed a fellow stableman in a fight in San Francisco in 1902, was pardoned and the life sentence of Fenion McAuliffe, fourth member of the Westwood quartet, committed to 29 years. The prison board will take up his case later.

Salter D. Worden, paroled following 17 years imprisonment for complicity in dynamiting a train in 1904, has applied for a pardon.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21.—Miss Lucille Hellman, daughter of Maurice S. and Mrs. Hellman, has announced her engagement to Alvin Frank of the firm of Harris, Frank & Co. They have been friends since childhood.

FORTY-SIX SUITS FILED
LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21.—Forty-six separate suits were filed against the Conservative Investment company by as many stock holders yesterday. It is charged that dividends were paid from the capital stock of the concern.

DYNAMITER CONVICTED
SACRAMENTO, Nov. 21.—W. K. Billings was convicted here of carrying dynamite on a streetcar. He was a member of an alleged dynamite ring supposed to have planned the destruction of Pacific Gas and Electric company property south of this city.

UNGRATEFUL BENEDEKIC
LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21.—Following a marriage ceremony performed by Justice Summerfield, the groom not only failed to pay, but walked off with a new hat the property of the magistrate.

MAY RUN AUTO NO MORE
FRESNO, Nov. 21.—R. L. Herring of Reedley, convicted of running down and killing a man and falling to stop, has applied for parole, and a condition asked by the parole officer is that he be forever barred from running a machine.

PAY TAXES JUST THE SAME
SACRAMENTO, Nov. 21.—Although Monday, November 24, has been declared a legal holiday by Governor Johnson, the attorney general holds it is legal to pay taxes on that date, the last before penalties are added for delinquencies.

PICKS UP WIRELESS MESSAGES
SACRAMENTO, Nov. 21.—W. H. Sutton, electrician at the capitol, while removing the electric lights on the dome for painting, conceived the idea of making the building a wireless station, and stretching a wire to his bench in the basement found the 2,500 sockets were as many ears, and he can hear many wireless messages from ships at sea.

SOME NUGGET THIS
OROVILLE, Nov. 21.—A nugget worth \$726.79 has been found in the old workings of the Emma mine, near here, by a lessee. It had been overlooked when a former company was working the property.

CHILD DIES OF BURNS
SANTA ROSA, Nov. 21.—The 8 year old son of J. E. and Mrs. Higley is dead as a result of burns and scalds incurred when the child pulled a leg from under a stove, upsetting a kettle of boiling water.

AID PROHIBITION FIGHT
LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21.—Mrs. Anna K. Bidwell of Chico and Mrs. R. H. Gilman of Pasadena subscribed \$1,000 each yesterday to the campaign fund of the prohibitionists, who want to make the state "dry" in 1914. It is sought to raise \$150,000, and \$5,000 was subscribed yesterday. Two thousand signatures to an initiative petition were secured.
