State News.

Cotton has been injured by the heavy rains in Marlboro.

There are twelve prisoners in the jail of Wainsboro.

A devil fish was captured in the back creek, Charleston harbor, last week.

A postoffice will be established at Helena, Newberry, with Mr. Zobel as postmaster.

A saw fish, with a weapon two feet in length, was caught by some fishermen off the front beach, Charleston.

Sheriff Geiger, of Lexington, has now in his custody ten prisoners, committed for different crimes.

The republicans of Aiken have nominated Dr. P. G. Rockwell for mayor. The election occurs on the 13th inst.

Col. John G. Pressley, a native of this State, but now residing in California has received the democratic nomination for the judgeship in his section.

Mr. H. Wessels, of Aiken, will soon establish a poultry farm near the outskirts of that town, for the purpose of raising chickens, ducks and geese for the trade.

Mr. Geo. Hood's store, in Brownsville, Marlboro county, was broken open last Saturday night, and about seventy dollars stolen.

Mr. John T. Wightman, sr., the father of the Rev. J. T. Wightman, of Charleston, died on Saturday morning last, at his residence in Wentworth street, in the ninety-second year of his age.

Miss Mary Harris, of Aiken, brought the first bale of new cotton to town Friday. It was raised upon her farm, and was purchased by J. H. Beckman for 134 cents per pound.

A notice for an application will be made at the next meeting of the general assembly for a new road in Lexington county, from the Columbia bridge to Huffman's burnt mill.

The Methodists of Darlington will have an entertainment on the 8th instant for the benefit of the Organ fund. A spelling bee will be the principal feature of the occasion.

Mr. Greenville Green, one of the most popular and successful farmers of Sleepy Hollow township, Aiken county, died last Friday of a congestive chill, at the age of sixty-two years.

The Baptist union met at Black Creek church, Darlington county, on the 27th ultimo. Ten churches were represented, and, after transacting the usual business, the convention adjourned to meet next at Cheraw.

The new mail route between Columbia and Fairbanks, better known as Koon's mill, in this county, has commenced operation. The mail is to be carried weekly, leaving Fairbanks on Friday for Columbia and returning on Saturday.

The first bale of new cotton of the season, at Sumter, was grown by Mr. J. B. Rouch, and sold to Mr. A. A. Solomons, on the 26th ult. It weighed 465 pounds, and was ginned from 1,308 pounds of seed cotton, at Mr. A. Hauser's steam mills, by one of the American needle gins.

How to Live Forever.—M. Robing, an eminent French chemist, announces to the French Academy of Medicine his belief that life exists only in combustion, but the combustion which occurs in our bodies—like that which takes place in chimneys—leaves a *debris* which is fatal. To remove this, he would administer lactic acid with ordinary food.
