Richland Southern Right's Association. The following is the Constitution of the Richland Southern Right's Association, adopted at a public meeting, held in Columbia on Thursday the 5th inst:

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. The name of the Association shall be "The Southern Right's Associa-tion, of Richland District." Its object shall be to organize more effectually the people of Richland in support of the interests of the South-to insure concert of action among the citizers of this and other Southern States-to vin licate their rights-to maintain the Federal compact in its origingl purity and simplicity, as the only means of preserving the Union—and to error and the Classer, ithorntes in any measure South Carolina may adopt for her defence, or that of her sister States, against the injustice and aggressions of those of the North.

Art. IV. There shall be a Council of Safety annually appointed, to consist of seven members for Commbia and three for each other election precinct, whose duty it shall be to consider all communications relating to the objects of the Association, to call extra meetings whenever five of their number may request the President, or in his absence, a Vice President, so to do : and to prepare and lay before the meeting such information and reports as they may deem important. The President, Vice Presidents and Secretaries shall be ex officio members of the Council.

Art. V. There shall be a regular quarterly meeting of the Association on the first Monday of October, January, April and July, in the Town Hill; and an annual meeting on the 5th day of September, the anniversary of the Association.

Art. VI. The Association shall appoint delegates to other Southern Right's Associations, conventions and mass meetings, whenever the Council of Safety may deem it expedient for its interest and purposes. Art. VII. The Association shall continne in existence and presevere in its efforts until the wrongs of the South are redress-ed, and the Federal Constitution restored to its original purity, or the State resume the powers heretotore delegated to the United States for special purposes.
