The following is the Constitution of the Richland Southern Right's Association, adopted at a public meeting, held in Columbia on Thursday the 5th inst:

CONSTITUTION.

Article I. The name of the Association shall be "The Southern Right's Association, of Richland District." Its object shall be to organize more effectively the people of Richland in support of the interests of the South—to insure concert of action among the citizens of this and other Southern States—to vindicate their rights—to maintain the Federal compact in its original purity and simplicity, as the only means of preserving the Union, and to secure the rights of all to the same.

By the time the steamer had reached her dock, foot of Canal street, an immense delegation of the sovereign people had gathered to greet the Queen of Song. They accompanied her carriage to the Irving House, receiving repeated bows

from her as she passed along, and responding to her courtesy with loud cheers. On reaching the Irving House the crowd which had accompanied her from the wharf halted, and in a few minutes a mass of four or five thousand people blocked up Broad way. Middle Lind appeared on the balcony and was received with great enthusiasm. In the evening she was serenaded.
