JUDGE PARKER'S RESCUE

When Judge Parker was aroused to the situation at the St. Louis convention he found it a condition not a theory that confronted him.

For the convention had rejected a simple recognition of the sound-money standard—rejected it after long and heated discussion in the Committee on Resolutions—rejected it in spite of eight years of disastrous defeat on this very issue—rejected it in defiance of the allegation in the Republican platform that the Democratic party cannot be trusted to maintain this standard.

Judge Parker therefore not only did an unprecedented and heroic thing morally in sending his dispatch, but he accomplished a master-stroke of political strategy and tactics.

The result is thus infinitely better than if a gold plank had been included in the platform, for it brought out in a clear light the strong character of the candidate, theretofore obscured by his silence, and showed him to be a man with right convictions and the full courage of them—unswayed by ambition, superior to any man's control.

Instead of resenting "dictation," as some of the delegates were at first inclined to do, before the precise nature of his message was known, Democrats ought to be most grateful to Judge Parker, as the hearty responses from all parts of the Union show that they are.

LOCAL POLITICS QUIET

The stir in local politics is slow, and more we cannot expect just yet. It is all a great waste of time to open up the campaign so early but it is well to bear in remembrance the qualities of the various candidates named.

A LITTLE MIXED.

The Republicans have not yet begun to recover from the demoralization into which they were pitched by Judge Parker's telegram to the Democratic National Convention.

A MARKED CHANGE.

The contrast in the platforms now and four years ago is not more marked than the contrast in the candidates. Judge Parker is as completely the antithesis of Bryan as he is of Roosevelt.

The change in the attitude of the Democratic party and in the character of its candidates presages a much-needed change in the control of the National Government, if the campaign shall be well and wisely managed and no grave mistakes are made in the pivotal States.

It is worth while to have a national convention for the sake of getting Colonel Watterson into his present state of cheerfulness and confidence.

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TO KEEP BRYAN IN THE WEST

His Canvass Would Be Most Good There—Wants Senatorship.

Washington, July 15.—Mr. Bryan's canvass for the Democratic national ticket is likely to be confined to Western States, where, it is thought, he can do the party most good, and at the same time best promote his individual interests.

It is becoming apparent that Mr. Bryan will not be wanted nor desired by the campaign managers in the East, where his utterances would be likely to do Judge Parker more harm than good.

Reading Company Could Supply All Nations for Fifty Years.

GREATEST MINES UNTOUCHED

Enormous Basin of Anthracite Extends From Pottsville Northward and May Yield Five Billion Tons.

Pottsville, Pa., July 15.—The Reading Coal and Iron Company alone can supply the world with anthracite coal for the next 50 years, was the statement given out at the local headquarters of the company to-day.

This is the reply of the company to some of the statements given out this week by Edward W. Parker, of the United States Geological Survey, in which he predicted that the mining of anthracite coal would cease entirely within 50 years.

In the almost virgin basin of hard coal, extending from Pottsville up the Schuylkill Valley toward Tanama, there are probably 5,000,000,000 tons of the best anthracite coal obtainable.

This is not a wild guess, but an approximate estimate by competent mining engineers.

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MANY EMIGRATE TO DAY

Record-breaking Number Going Back to Europe with Small Fortunes.

The American Line steamship Frieland, which sails this morning for Liverpool, will take out the largest number of emigrants ever booked for passage from Philadelphia.

A majority have sailed for years in this and many by States, and have accumulated small fortunes, which they are taking back to the native land.

On account of the unusual number of passengers the American Line has arranged to do away, for this trip only, with the second-class restrictions. As a result the deck used exclusively by second-class passengers will be open to stowage passengers.

This move on the part of the company is by no means a phase of the cut-rate war, according to one of the officials. The second class will be re-established on the way back. It is roughly estimated that more than \$400,000 will go out of this country to various parts of Europe when the 500 emigrants sail this morning. This vast sum represents their savings.
