A Letter from Charles Francis Adams to Lieut. General Donnell, Dec. 2nd, 1877.

My Dear Sir: - I feel that it is so dark to-day in my library that I can scarcely write straight to recognize yours of the 1st ult., and the reception of a copy of your remarks.

It is a firm but moderate statement of the case before us in politics, and so far as I perceive in the public press my adequate treatment of the matter.

The moral effect upon the public mind of success in elections through the agency of fraud, as exemplified in the last election, ought to be counteracted with the greatest vigor, or else both sides will be sure to concentrate all their powers upon the art of electioneering.

It does no credit to the Republican party that it has not instituted an honest investigation of the facts of the case last year.

Yet there appears to be a languid movement toward an amendment of the Constitution, as if that was not necessary to reinstate matters.

The earnest spirit which did not manifest itself in the past year, can come out of artificial devices.

The question, shall fraud be justified by success? The answer is, no.

It is not that as time passes, the importance of this question will be more appreciated.

To me it is of little importance, as matters of this kind rarely move so rapidly as the generations of the race perpetuate changes.
