During the first nine ballots Mr. Cooper's vote ranged from 22 1/2 to 30, having a majority nearly every ballot. After that the name of Zach. Bryant, Esq., was put before the convention.

The last two ballots resulted as follows: Cooper 35, Day 14, Bryant 5, and Gay 4. 11th ballot—Cooper 39, Day 10, and Bryant 9; Mr. Cooper receiving the required two-thirds.

He was then unanimously nominated and declared the candidate. The following gentlemen were appointed delegates to the Senatorial Convention: Wm. Shane, John Fly, D. L. Rivers, B. F. Bond, W. Moody, J. C. Hartsfield, T. C. Patterson, S. P. Hill, Dr. Vaughn, T. D. Locke, Thomas Brooks, D. C. Felen, J. A. Jackson, A. Jordan, Richard Wade, R. Goodman, Esq. Cox, Wm. Smith, M. F. Parker, J. F. The chairman and secretaries were added to the list of delegates, and it was agreed to hold the convention at Milan on Saturday, the 26th inst.

The following County Executive Committee was appointed: A. Jordan, D. L. Rivers, J. H. Glass, J. M. Coulter and T. D. Locke.

The Trenton News-Gazette of last week also had several good pieces in reference to the injustice done us by the Memphis press. Since our "peace meeting" the excitement has nearly died out, and the good people have returned to their respective occupations, and the merry songs of the workmen again greet our ears as they engage in their different vocations, toiling for an honest living, ever remembering that "man shall live by the sweat of his brow."

Some of the papers of this State say the recent troubles in this county was caused by a quarrel of one or two whites with negroes at a barbecue a day or two previous to the insurrection. The facts are these: The negroes had a barbecue about two months since. Jo. Hale, Henry Barnett, D. C. Palmer and Monroe Merrick, whites, wishing to procure some barbecued meat, went and asked the price per head. They were informed that it was fifty cents. They then asked the price of a whole carcass, and were told they could have it for two dollars.

They bought it and went to one side and ate what they wanted, giving the remains to two or three boys. Joshua Webb, the negro leader, (also leader in the recent outrage,) then demanded fifty cents more, saying that more than four men ate. This the white men refused to pay, when the negroes collected and threatened their lives if they did not. Under this threat they paid and left. Webb, we understand, was grumbling frequently about this afterward, and it is thought the negroes made this a pretext for the Pickettville outbreak.

We hope some of the papers that have been so industriously publishing everything in favor of the negroes engaged in this affair will copy this statement.

Proclamation by the Governor. JOHN C. BROWN, Governor of the State of Tennessee—To all who shall see these presents, greeting: WHEREAS, INFORMATION HAS been received that a body of armed men, whose names are unknown, forcibly entered the jail of Gibson county at an early hour on the morning of August 26, 1874, and forcibly and unlawfully took from thence sixteen prisoners, committed under due process of law, and thereupon, and on the 27th day of August, 1874, murdered four of them, mortally wounded two and removed the other ten, of whom nothing has since been heard, and said jail breakers are still at large.

Now, therefore, I, John C. Brown, Governor, as aforesaid, by virtue of the power and authority in me vested, do hereby offer a reward of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the detection and apprehension of any one and each of said parties, the reward to be paid upon final conviction. In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and have caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed, at Nashville, on the 26th day of August, 1874.
