SMALL CHANGE.

Good-bye 1887.
Welcome to 1888.
Will you "turn over a new leaf to-morrow?"
A light snow fell here last Monday, but soon melted.
Service was held only at the Methodist church by the whites last Sunday, when a large congregation heard appropriate sermons morning and evening by Bro. Hayes.
Dr. W. E. Stone had a leg badly broken last Thursday by a team running away with him. He was moving his mother, and was about getting in the wagon when the team started.
A dining was given at the residence of Mr. R. Y. Moore last Tuesday, when about thirty-six members of the family and relatives, besides several other guests, enjoyed a bountiful and elegant feast.
Jim Cole, colored, stole a bottle of whisky from Thompson's saloon Wednesday night, and was put in the lockup Thursday morning. He was released by Sheriff Bryant, and, in default of bond, started to jail yesterday morning in charge of a son of deputy sheriff Chapman. On the road he untied the rope with which he was bound and made his escape.

The Christmas tree at the Baptist church last Monday night was a success. The proceeds, \$22.10, and ten loads of wood, were donated to the poor of Milan.

The bishop has placed Rev. B. F. Peoples in charge of Trezevant circuit, in place of Rev. J. H. Witt, who was made presiding elder. This change is much better for Bro. Peoples, as he has a home here and will not have to move his family.

While there was very little drunkenness on the street Saturday, yet large quantities of liquor were sold, mostly to country people. Wallace Lusk sold four barrels of whiskey, besides other liquors. At night the usual mischief was indulged in, fire-works burned, etc.

The following named trainmen on the L. & N. may now be claimed as part of Milan's population. Those of the accommodation train have their families here and stay here every night. The freight crews stop over here, two each, every other night and spend Sundays here. The accommodation crew is—Sol. Buck, conductor; O. Slusser and Mr. Elmore, engineers; Messrs McGrath and Scott, firemen, and Mr. Murray baggage and express messenger. Messrs. B. Skates and Wm. Savery are conductors of the local freight between here and Erin, and Messrs. J. Waddle and G. Tibbets are conductors of local freights between here and Memphis. We did not get the names of the engineers and other members of the crews on the freight trains. Besides these local freight crews, a large number of other crews get their meals with Mrs. Kate Boyd, at the Milan House.

The foregoing official reports of the several officers were each audited by the Finance Committee and by them approved, and on their endorsement were adopted by the Board.

The regular business of the Board having been transacted and before the final adjournment of that body the following resolutions were unanimously adopted, by a rising vote, and ordered spread upon the minutes:

Resolved, That we, the Board of Aldermen, fully appreciate the services of our retiring mayor, E. N. Stone, and the kindness shown us, do regret that our official relations have been dissolved by the expiration of his term of office, and that we tender to him our best wishes for his future success.

Resolved further, That as the term of J. H. Blankinship has expired, we desire to express our appreciation of valuable services rendered us in the faithful and very efficient discharge of every duty as alderman, and we

regret that our pleasant relations have ceased.

Resolved further, Our Marshal, W. B. Bryant, has performed all duties imposed upon by the by-laws and ordinances of the town in a faithful manner, and to the entire satisfaction of this body.

A committee from the Board of Aldermen having procured a gold-headed cane as a present to Mayor E. N. Stone, W. G. Harrison was elected to make the presentation, which he did in the following manner:

Kind Sir: In behalf of my fellow-aldermen I have the honor to present to you this cane as a token of our appreciation for you as an officer.

Kind Sir: We desire to impress upon your mind that the friendly relation that has existed between us as officers will continue to follow you through all your private relations of life. And we regret very much that by the expiration of the term of your office our official associations shall cease, but we are proud to say in your behalf that you have been to us a faithful and vigilant executive. In your retirement we trust that we will not entirely lose the benefit of your wise counsel, when the best interest of our town demands it. When Milan shall have grown to be a city, and you should need this as a staff for your support, we trust and know that you will have no cause to regret any of your official acts. In conclusion, we hope that the same success may attend you in your private relations of life that has crowned your efforts as an officer. With this, we bid you an affectionate farewell.

Mayor Stone accepted the gift in a few well-chosen remarks, expressing his gratitude not only for the present, but for the sentiment and good will that prompted the act. The Board then adjourned.

Mayor elect, J. P. Rhodes, presented himself and the oath of office was also administered to him by A. Jordan, J. P. Thereupon the mayor conveyed the Board in regular session. There appearing no business to transact the Board, on motion, adjourned to meet at the next regular meeting on the 2d Monday in January, A. D. 1888, next, at 7 o'clock p. m.
