

CONFEDERATE ARMY

A Confederate Account of the Battle of Antietam. The Richmond correspondent of the London Times says: The morning of the 17th found General Lee strongly posted, but with no more than 40,000 men when the battle commenced.

At four in the afternoon, Gen. A. P. Hill's division came up and joined the Confederate right. It was well that Gen. Burnside's advance on the Federal left was so long delayed, and was eventually made with overwhelming numbers.

This, then, is one of the battles with respect to which General McClellan, admitting a loss on his own side of 15,000 men, estimates his enemy's loss at about 25,000 dead, wounded and missing. The reader who remembers the position occupied by General Lee's forces will smile at General McClellan's estimate.
