BY TELEGRAPH. Lee's Passage Through Chester Gap Confirmed.

REBEL ARMY AT CULPEPER. Prisoners and Cattle Captured by Buford's Cavalry.

A GLOOMY REBEL ADMISSION. WASHINGTON, July 25.—Admiral received today from the Army of the Potomac, fully confirmed the report that the three corps of Lee's army passed through Chester Gap on Thursday and Friday, and are now at and south of Culpeper.

His passage was opposed by Buford's cavalry, but he was compelled to fall back. He, however, hung upon their rear, and captured many prisoners and cattle and sheep, as heretofore mentioned. Longstreet's corps passed through Culpeper on Friday, and camped that night south of the town.

Intelligent rebel officers now in our hands admit that this is the most gloomy period for the hopes of the Confederacy.
