A POLICEMAN SHOT BY AN OLD OFFENDER. For some time past a man named Uhlir, residing at the corner of E street and Fifth street, has been a source of terror to the family because of his desperate habits.

Police officer of the Eighth precinct has, during several days, had a warrant in his pocket for the arrest of Uhlir on a charge of being abusive to his mother, but could not find him.

Yesterday afternoon, one of the females appeared at the residence of Uhlir, and she was arrested, as his conduct was outrageous. Officer Lusk, (whose wife is a resident of the city) was called to the residence, but did not find him, and after conversing with the family a few moments, were about to return to the station.

Uhlir, however, suddenly appeared, and without any warning, seized the officer by the collar, and entering near the nipple of his left breast and holding the nipple in his right hand, the force of the shot killed Uhlir. Not satisfied with this, Uhlir struck the officer on the head with the rifle, cutting it severely.

Notwithstanding this rough treatment, Officer Lusk called for a doctor, and was assisted Officer Atkinson to take Uhlir to the station-house, some eight squares distant. Uhlir was taken to the station-house, and the rifle ball from Mr. Lusk's breast. He could not say whether or not the wound was dangerous.
