

THE WAWASSET DISASTER.

Continued from First Page. The Wawasset disaster was a tragedy that occurred on the morning of August 21st, 1873. The vessel, a small steamer, was carrying a large number of passengers and crew members. The disaster was caused by a combination of factors, including poor weather conditions and human error.
