

FORTY-THIRD CONGRESS.

REPORT TO GET UP CIVIL ROADS DEFEATED IN THE HOUSE.

Mr. ALBON presented memorial of citizens of Mississippi asking Congress to take charge of the levees of the Mississippi. Referred to Select Committee on Levees of the Mississippi.

Mr. DAVIS presented joint resolutions of West Virginia Legislature, asking Congress to divide one-half of the proceeds of the sale of public lands among the several States for the benefit of public schools. Referred to Public Lands.

Mr. CONKLING presented a petition from Mrs. Belva A. Lockwood, asking Congress to pass an act declaring that no woman otherwise qualified shall be debarred from practice in the courts of the United States on account of sex or color. Referred to Judiciary.

Mr. SAUBUSBY presented memorial of citizens of Delaware asking repeal of tax on adjacent lands. Referred to Committee on Finance.

Mr. SARGENT introduced bill to prevent having at the Naval Academy. Referred to Naval Affairs.

Mr. MERRISON introduced bill to modify rules of evidence in Court of Claims. Referred to Judiciary.

Also bill granting pensions to certain surviving soldiers and sailors of the Mexican war. Referred to Pension Committee.

Mr. SCOTT called up bill supplementary to the act to incorporate the Texas Pacific Railroad.

He stated that the bill was designed to enable the company to execute a mortgage upon the portion of the road now under construction.

Mr. EDMUNDS moved an amendment that nothing in this act shall be construed to have the effect to nullify said mortgage to any extent.

Mr. FRATT called up House bill amending the pension laws, providing that all persons who have lost an arm or above the elbow shall receive \$24 per month, with war-benefit amendments.

On motion of Mr. WINDS, the Sergeant-at-Arms was directed for the remainder of the session to exclude from the marble room and adjacent corridors all persons entitled to the privilege of the floor of the Senate.

Mr. SARGENT called up the conference report on the naval appropriation bill, which was adopted.

Mr. HOWE called attention to a letter addressed him by the Chief Clerk of the House, asking serious charges against Mr. Clapp, the Congressional printer, and stating that the Joint Committee on Printing had been acquainted with these charges and that he should have taken action thereon.

Mr. ANTONY said the proprietors of the Globe were very excellent and very persistent in their efforts to get the printing done under the impression that it was their right and their duty to instruct a committee of Congress to investigate the matter.

On motion of Mr. STANARD, of Mo., the improvement of the mouth of the Mississippi was taken up and passed.

UNION PACIFIC RAILROAD. Mr. WRIGHT had a bill introduced up the bill in relation to Union Pacific railroad which he had reported in March last, from the Judiciary Committee, on Wednesday next in the morning hours.

Mr. INGALLS said that he would then offer as a substitute for the bill the bill to amend the act to incorporate the Union Pacific Railroad, which he had introduced on the 11th of March last.

THE DEFICIENCY APPROPRIATION. Mr. SARGENT then called up the deficiency appropriation bill, which he had reported from the House, appropriated \$3,372,155, as amended by the Committee on Appropriations, for the fiscal year ending on the 30th of September next.

Mr. SARGENT stated that the policy of the Government was to keep three millions on four contracts in Arizona and New Mexico. The Government must either have the money or it was much cheaper to feed them. Some time ago, in a war with the Sioux Indians, it spent about a million dollars to kill forty-five of them.

Mr. SARGENT, in explaining the necessity for the deficiency appropriation, by reason of the fact that the bill for the fiscal year was not composed of politicians, but of eminent medical men who had established the most effective sanitary regulations in the world, which the health of the District had been wonderfully improved.

The committee suggested in favor of striking out the second section of the bill providing that it shall not be lawful for any department of the Government to expend any money for any year in excess of appropriations made by Congress for that fiscal year, or to incur any liability for such year, or to receive any payment of money in excess of such appropriations.

Mr. SHERMAN opposed striking out the second section, which he said only provided that no officer of the Government should violate the Constitution. He considered it just as much stealing as robbing the mail for an officer of the Government to divert an appropriation from its lawful use, or to make appropriations in advance of appropriations.

Considerable debate ensued on the matter, and it was contended that at all times it was absolutely necessary to anticipate appropriations. The following amendments were also adopted: To appropriate \$10,000 for a pedestal for the bronze statue of Jefferson, to be placed in the National Statuary Hall; increasing the appropriation for the relief of the District of Columbia from \$18,386 to \$31,772.
