

THE DEAD STATESMAN.

A NATION PAYS TRIBUTE TO HIS MEMORY.

Yesterday a Day of Mourning--Expressions of Deep Respect from All Classes--A Proclamation by the President.

At the Cabinet meeting yesterday the death of Senator Morton was the subject of regretful discussion and deep respect for the eminent statesman who had just passed away.

The President at a late hour yesterday evening issued the following PROCLAMATION:

EXECUTIVE MANDATE. I lament the sad occasion which makes it my duty to notify the people of the death of a distinguished statesman whose death yesterday at his home in Indianapolis, has been known to the people by telegraphic announcement.

The services of Oliver P. Morton to the nation in the past have been so numerous and so distinguished that it is not possible to do justice to his memory in a few lines. He was a man of high character and high ability, and his death is a great loss to the country.

The several Executive Departments will be closed on the day of his funeral and appropriate honors will be paid to the memory of the deceased statesman by the whole nation.

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THE NATIONAL CAPITAL. DOINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE AND LEGISLATIVE BRANCHES.

Information Gathered at the Capitol, in the Departments, and About Town by the Reporters of the National Republic.

The Senate transacted no business yesterday, and adjourned to Tuesday, after passing resolutions in respect to the late Senator Morton.

Before the hour for the meeting of the Senate the committee on Privileges and Elections held a meeting, when Senator Mitchell, chairman, laid before the committee the following telegram:

Mr. O. P. Morton and family, Indianapolis, Ind.: The members of the committee on Privileges and Elections have heard with sorrow of the death of Senator Morton, and regret to hear that he died in the full vigor of his mind and body.
