A SENSATIONAL REPORT.

No Case of Yellow Fever Found in Washington.

Health Officer Townsend's Precautions—Refugees to be Overhauled and Their Effects Fumigated—Preparations for Carrying for Fever Patients if any should Appear—Arrivals, &c.

A Yellow Fever Canard. The false reports, concerning the existence of yellow fever in this city, mentioned in yesterday's REPUBLICAN as being widely circulated by sensation-mongers, found their way into print in the Post yesterday. That paper sought to alarm its readers by the announcement that "to all appearances, we have now in the city a case of yellow fever, which, though only in a light form, may be the precursor of something far more dangerous and violent."

The only grounds which could be discovered yesterday upon which the report could be based, was the fact that Colonel J. M. Keating, editor of the Memphis Appeal, who arrived in the city Tuesday evening, and immediately resumed his journey to New York, was suffering during his short stay here with a mild attack of diarrhea. Colonel Morris, the gentleman reported by the Post to have the fever, is in perfect health and has not been ill at all since his arrival from Memphis. The publication of the effect of sending many anxious inquiries to the health officer, and Dr. Townsend assured every one that the report was without foundation and there was no reason for alarm.

Dr. Townsend's report has been perfectly correct, so that if any person should be taken down with the fever in this city, he would know it immediately, and would be able to isolate and treatment of the patient. The National Board of Health, through their agents at Memphis, are kept informed of the movements of persons leaving the city, and Dr. Townsend will be posted in regard to all parties coming to this city. Counsel Casey Young, of Memphis, has also arranged to have a personal interview with the health officer, to whom he will inform the Health Officer. All refugees will be subjected to examination and their baggage and effects thoroughly disinfected. Last year there were several suspicious cases. If a case occurs Dr. Townsend intends to personally look after it, so there will be no possibility of the disease being introduced here. The arrangements are so complete that a chance patient would at once be isolated and provided with medical attendance, nurses and provisions. The health officer has been made simply as a precaution. The District Commissioners have conferred upon the Health Officer full power to act, and provided all necessary means for carrying out every necessary measure that may be deemed advisable. Nearly every train from the South brings some one from Memphis, but it is doubtful whether any can come to the city without the knowledge of the Health Officer. In addition to his arrangement with the National Board of Health and Col. Young, the police department and every hotel and boarding-house proprietor are kept posted in the effort to keep the Health Officer informed of all arrivals from the infected district.

Dr. Townsend yesterday morning visited a woman who had been removed to the city who arrived from Memphis last Saturday on their way to Virginia. The woman resided in the suburbs of Memphis, but left some days ago, and was accompanied by health authorities of Memphis in their effort to prevent the disease from being introduced here.

The eighth precinct also notified the Health Officer of the presence of a woman who recently arrived from Memphis. Upon investigation it was found that she had left on the 10th inst. had her baggage thoroughly disinfected and received a clean bill of health.

Suspicious Arrivals. Yesterday morning a man named Patrick Harrington, accompanied by his wife and three children, arrived at the Baltimore and Ohio depot, and inquired for the Health Officer. The family had been living in Savannah, Ga., until about three weeks ago, when they decided to come north. He was an Irish man, and had been in the city for some time. 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CURRENCY STATISTICS.

The Comptroller of the Currency reports the amount of additional circulation issued during the present year as \$6,155,203. During the months of January, February and March \$3,357,422 was issued, and during the months of April, May, June and July \$2,817,781, making an average of \$769,400 of additional circulation issued monthly since January 1.

The amount of 10-40 bonds withdrawn by the banks during the month of June was \$247,800, and during the month of July, \$1,568,450, and since July 21, the date of the expiration of the last call, \$4,065,150, averaging about a half a million a day.

The amount of legal-tender notes deposited since the first of July, 1878, is \$1,387,500, averaging less than \$33,000 a day. For the remainder 4 per cent. bonds have almost universally been substituted since that date.

The Comptroller has issued a circular to the National banks requesting them to inform him of the amount of State, county, city, town or other municipal bonds held by them for the year 1878. The statements of the banks will be tabulated when received, and the results published in the Comptroller's report to Congress at the next session.

A Heavy Freight Train.

The traffic in freight over the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad at present is reported to be heavier than at any time since the road was built. Every available car is in use and every locomotive taxed to its utmost capacity. The Cumberland News says that on three or four occasions the heavy freight trains have passed through this city numbered from forty to fifty, including over a thousand loaded cars loaded East and two thousand empty cars going West, and a large amount of freight. The powerful locomotives haul from forty to fifty loaded cars, and from sixty to eighty empty ones. A goodly proportion of the east-bound freight is meat and other grain, but there was a fair share of coal, salt, iron, &c.
