FOR some months, or since the change occurred in the management of our evening cotemporary, the Star, it has been publicly predicted that it would soon gracefully glide into politics on the Democratic side. Its leading editorial yesterday evening on the New York Democratic State Convention went far to confirm that prediction. Its early news from the convention and the comments thereon were so much at variance that the numerous readers of that heretofore neutral journal were led to wonder what had happened to bring such a change over the spirit of its dream. The Republican portion of its readers are considerably exercised over its present political attitude. Time will show whether they are nursing the germs of Democracy in bestowing patronage in that direction.

BOTH official and unofficial reports from the Canadian fishing grounds, in the neighborhood of the mouth of the St. Lawrence, represent that our treaty rights are seriously and constantly interfered with by the Canadians. In fact, the latter seem to think that the grounds belong to them and that they can exclude therefrom whomsoever they choose. These facts make it appear that England did not consult her American colonists when the Washington treaty was negotiated and ratified, nor has she since then informed them of its purport. The moral of all this would seem to be that the fishery clauses of that Convention should be abrogated or amended—a suggestion which, it is well known, was some time ago adopted, and is now being acted upon by Secretary EVARTS. But the question is, Will the Canadians pay any more attention to a new treaty obligation than they do to the one now in existence?

TOM EWING has been hauled over the coals by the La Grange (Ga.) Reporter for having declared that there are not "a thousand men in this country who believe in the right of secession." The Reporter says, in contradiction of this declaration, that "there are as many men as ever in the South who believe in secession," and then goes on in a plausible way to say that the "advisability of secession is another matter."

Here we have in a nutshell an illustration of the difference between Northern and Southern Democracy—conceding for the sake of argument, that the Northern democrats are honest, as Mr. EWING probably is. But we ask, in view of all the facts, how Mr. EWING, who pretends to be a loyal man, and who is justly proud of his war record, can consort politically with these avowed Southern secessionists without becoming contaminated, or without being most emphatically inconsistent? If a man is to be judged by the company he keeps—and it is a safe rule—General EWING is no better than LAMAR, SINGLETON, CHALMERS or the Reporter editor, all of whom are Democrats and agree with the latter in the following declaration:

About the only thing "set led" by the war in this respect was the fact that the South was not powerful enough—and never will be—to make secession successful. The South may be "radical" in her views on the right of secession, but she has no reason to change them; on the contrary, the history of this country since the war has the more strongly confirmed the views she already had.

THE DYNAMITE EXPLOSION.

AS THE NATIONAL REPUBLICAN has steadily predicted, TILDEN has had and held the Democratic State Convention at Syracuse, and has succeeded in palming ROBINSON upon the people as the Democratic candidate for Governor. This end has not been reached without difficulty, but it has nevertheless been attained through much tribulation. Tammany had given warning of its defection in case of TILDEN's insisting upon carrying out its programme, but the Cipher Ore was not to be diverted from his purpose. He had determined to have his own way, though he should fracture the machine in the attempt. He was accommodated. ROBINSON was nominated—the TILDEN programme was carried out and Tammany, led by JOHN KELLY, wheeled out of line, breaking the party and insuring its defeat, especially since the Tammanyites have placed him in nomination for Governor on their own hook, thereby insuring the solidity of the bolt.

The whole of the first day of the convention was devoted to the distribution and interchange of jabs between the factions, with a view to placation and unification. COX, KERNAN, and that prince of political humblings and apostates, GILBERT C. WALKER, made speeches in the interest of reconciliation up to the hour of adjournment on the first day, but all to no effect. Yesterday, after a night of debauchery and carousal, the convention met again, and it soon became apparent that placation had been sluggish with its work, and Tammany rallied in war-paint and feathers, while the Tildenites were fierce and more defiant than ever. The latter were confident of success, while JOHN KELLY got in his work with blood in his eye. He saw that he was beaten unless he could inaugurate a successful coup d'etat, and under a feeling of desperation his cohorts attempted to put JOHN C. JACOBS in nomination by acclamation, and fancied that they had succeeded in securing a snap judgment on the TILDEN forces; but they reckoned without the host. The Tildenites rallied, bull-dozed Mr. JACOBS from his propriety, and proceeded to nominate Mr. ROBINSON in accordance with the mandates of Mr. TILDEN. The Tammanyites bolted from the convention in the midst of a torrent of hisses, howls and invectives—leaving their adversaries a clear field—and then their work was speedily accomplished, according to the TILDEN slate. The breach is so wide and the chasm is so broad that there will be no shaking of hands between the two factions across it. This insures the success of the Republican ticket beyond a question. "JOHN KELLY'S 60,000 followers" referred to by the Evening Star are now lost to the Democratic score, and the Republicans are assured of victory if they prosecute a vigorous campaign.

SECRETARY SCHURZ'S "ONLY HOPE."

The "Herald" Post declares that its "only hope" now is the defeat of CORNELL in New York.—St. Louis Globe Democrat.

It is well known that the "Herald" Post is owned in part and inspired chiefly in its political utterances by Secretary SCHURZ. He sounds the war cry against the Republican party of New York with a rebel whoop and yell, and does so with sufficient haste and distinctness to reveal his "true inwardness." Secretary SCHURZ'S "only hope" now is the defeat of CORNELL in New York. What is the objective point of this hope so precipitately asserted? It is simply that CORNELL shall be defeated and the party from whose hand SCHURZ receives his daily bread shall be borne down by disaster in the pivotal State of the contest in 1880. The hope of SCHURZ now is that the State of New York may be handed over to TILDEN or whoever the Democrats may select as their standard-bearer, and that the Nation may be held under the domination of the Democratic party, which is controlled by the rebel Brigadiers. He has declared against GRANT and BLAINE, and now sees the "only hope" worth living for residing in the defeat of the Republican party of the State of New York, which would be equivalent to giving the whole Nation away to its enemies. What treachery! What ingratitude in one who to-day holds a distinguished position under a Republican Administration and is indebted to it for rescuing him from a fallen and degraded political estate. History furnishes few parallels to this act of party disloyalty and insensibility to favors and honors, and we can see no good excuse for passing it by in silence.

Treachery in the camp of the Union army on the eve of the capture of Richmond would have been as tolerable as this act of betrayal of the Republican party now, which proclaims to the world that the "only hope" is to defeat it in the State of New York. The Republican party will not, we feel confident, be defeated in the Empire State; but whether it is or not, that result, whatever it may be, cannot absolve Secretary SCHURZ from the responsibility of expressing such a hope. At least, after having given utterance to it, he can expect no favor at the hands of any true Republican, neither should he receive it. The most meritorious act that the President can now perform in view of Secretary SCHURZ'S treachery is to quietly ask him to "step down and out" of a Republican Cabinet.

CONVINCING evidence is now at hand that the last—ever to be the last—Democratic President of these United States, JAMES BUCHANAN, of unhappy memory, was fully cognizant of the Southern preparations for rebellion in 1860, if he did not take part therein. This testimony is furnished by the Hon. THOMAS L. CLINGMAN of North Carolina, in his recently printed book of personal reminiscences. In 1860 Mr. C. was in the Senate and soon after the election of Mr. LINCOLN called upon JAKE THOMPSON, then Secretary of the Interior, when, as he describes it, the following incident occurred:

On my entering the room, Mr. THOMPSON (the Secretary) said to me: "CLINGMAN, I am glad you have called, for I intended presently to go up to the Senate and see you. I have been appointed commissioner by the State of Mississippi to go down to North Carolina to get your State to secede, and I wished to talk with you about your legislative before I start down in the morning to Raleigh, and to learn what you think of my chances of success." I said to him: "I did not know that you had resigned." He answered: "Oh, no, I have not resigned." "Then," I replied, "I suppose you resign in the morning?" "No," he answered, "I do not intend to resign, for Mr. BUCHANAN wished us all to hold on and go out with him on the 4th of March." "But," I said, "does Mr. BUCHANAN know for what purposes you are going to North Carolina?" "Certainly he knows my object." Being surprised by this statement, I told Mr. THOMPSON that Mr. BUCHANAN was probably so much perplexed by his situation that he had not fully considered the matter, and that as he was already involved in difficulty, he ought not to add to his burdens, and then suggested to Mr. THOMPSON that he had better see Mr. BUCHANAN again, and by way of inducing him to think the matter over, mention to him what I had been saying to him. Mr. THOMPSON said: "Well, I can do so, but I think he fully understands it."

In the evening I met Mr. THOMPSON at a small social party, and as soon as I approached him he said: "I know I could not be mistaken. I told Mr. BUCHANAN all you said, and he told me he wished me to go, and hoped I might succeed." I could not help exclaiming: "Was there ever before any president who sent out his own Cabinet ministers to incite insurrection against his own government?" The fact that Mr. THOMPSON did go on the errand, and had a public reception before the legislature, and returned to his position in the Cabinet is known; but this incident serves to recall it.






