Items of Interest at Home and Abroad.

A Boy Killed in an Affray—New Mineral Discoveries in Wyoming—An Active Volcano—Wife Murdered and Succeeded—Inmate Auldham Burned—The Two Hundred Inmates Rescued in Safety.

Manhattan Club Rooms Robbed. NEW YORK, March 8.—The Manhattan Club rooms were entered by burglars last night and robbed of \$1,200.

The Sixth Victim Dead. WILKESBARRE, Pa., March 8.—John S. Watkins, the sixth victim of the Johnstown mine accident, died last night.

A Sheriff Murdered by Prisoners. COLUMBUS, Ind., March 8.—Sheriff Spurgeon was attacked by three prisoners in the jail to-night and fatally wounded. Two of them escaped.

Louisiana Democratic Convention. NEW ORLEANS, March 8.—The Democratic State Convention is called to meet here April 12 to select delegates to the Cincinnati convention.

Fatal Juvenile Shooting Affray. SHELBYVILLE, Ky., March 8.—Joseph McCreeight was fatally shot to-day by Newton Shannon. Both are boys. It is claimed that the shooting was in self-defense.

Through Trains on Cincinnati Southern Road. CINCINNATI, March 8.—Regular through passenger trains on the Cincinnati Southern railroad passed over the entire length of the road, both north and south, to-day.

A Resolution to Remove an Officer. ALBANY, March 8.—A joint resolution was introduced in the Assembly to remove John F. Levy from the office of superintendent of insurance. It was laid over.

Mineral Discoveries in Wyoming. CHEYENNE, W. T., March 8.—Much excitement prevails here over reported valuable mineral discoveries near Rawlins. An active volcano is reported at Brown's Park.

An Officer Removed. LITTLE ROCK, March 8.—Colonel W. S. Oliver, superintendent of the Federal building now in course of erection here, has been removed, his friends allege, for political reasons.

The Lewis Will Forgers. TRENTON, N. J., March 8.—In the United States District court the counsel in the Lewis will forgery case commenced the summing up. The case will not be closed until to-morrow.

Tragic End of Miscegenationists. CHICAGO, Ill., March 8.—Elijah Taylor, a negro living on a farm six miles from here, and married to a white woman, to-day, in a fit of jealousy, shot her fatally and then killed himself.

A Prisoner Shot Dead. NEW ORLEANS, March 8.—Last evening four policemen arrested Robert Wise (colored), charged with disturbing the peace. Wise made more resistance than was expected, he was shot dead by Corporal Murphy.

The Bucholz Trial. BRIDGEPORT, Conn., March 8.—In the Bucholz trial every witness testified to seeing three desperate-looking characters near the scene of the Schulz murder on the afternoon of its occurrence.

An Asylum Burned. TOPEKA, Kas., March 8.—The insane asylum at Osawatomie, containing some 200 inmates, is on fire. The main building of the asylum was completely destroyed. All the inmates were rescued. The loss is estimated at \$40,000.

Loss of a Bark and Crew. ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 8.—The bark Emma, Captain Parry, bound from Newport, Wales, for this port with a cargo of iron, was wrecked at Niggerhead in the Bay of Fundy last night. The crew, first mate and five of the crew were drowned.

Heavy Robbery. NEW YORK, March 8.—David Roberts, A. Carter, Jacob Faulkner, J. J. McNeuch, and William Albert and William Linden, ex-prosecutors, have been arrested for committing robberies in the store of H. B. Clifton & Co. to the amount of \$40,000. Roberts has confessed.

The "Mollie Maguire" Revived. NEW YORK, March 8.—A special to the Telegram from Port Carbon, Pa., says, on authority of Marshal Heister, that the "Mollie Maguire" case is "every word true." The marshals' men see mysterious movements all over the coal regions, but the movements are very secret.

Chinese for the South. ST. LOUIS, March 8.—Hon. Henry F. Schurz, a planter at Cairo, Wis., writes to-day, in a letter, and says that in view of the necessities from the South and the disturbed condition of things in his section, the planters have considered the question to some extent attempting to obtain Chinese laborers. A Murderer Allowed to Escape. CINCINNATI, March 8.—On Saturday night Andrew Moynihan, who was confined in the Levensport, Ind., jail for the murder of John Jackson, of Brooklyn, N. Y., last September, finding four doors between him and liberty closed, but not locked, quickly made his way out, carefully closing the doors after him. He has not since been heard from, although a reward has been offered for his body, dead or alive. Much excitement prevails, and the officials are severely criticized for the negligence which permitted his escape.

Pennsylvania Riot Bribery Cases. HARRISBURG, March 8.—The riot bribery cases came up at 2 o'clock today. Judge Pearson and Henderson on the bench. Messrs. Brewster, Mann, Cassidy, Hess, Lambertson, Albright, Weiss, Hall, Jordan and Armstrong, counsel for defense, and Messrs. Hollinger (district attorney), J. W. Sinton, N. Y. East, A. L. Green, Jere Black, J. C. McAlary and George Lewis, counsel for the Commonwealth, were present. In the cases of the Commonwealth vs. Charles B. Saylor and James B. Crawford, charged with corrupt solicitation, pleas of guilty were entered by the defendants. William H. Kenble entered a plea of guilty and protested that he never did corruptly offer any money or thing of value to either of the persons named in the bill of indictment. Judge Pearson seriously doubted the legality of this form of plea.

The President's Inter-Oceanic Canal Message.

Hay's Charges Not Sustained. YANKEETOWN, N. H., March 8.—The fourth case against Dr. Livingston, Indian Agent at Crow Creek, charged with embezzlement by the Hay-Hammond dynasty, was concluded to-day in the United States court. The jury was out three days and finally disagreed. Eleven votes for returning a special verdict that the defendant had made a technical violation of the law, but was innocent of any intent to defraud the Government or individuals. The seventh man stood for unconditional acquittal. There are three more indictments pending.

British Parliament to be Dissolved. LONDON, March 8.—In the House of Lords to-day the bill for the dissolution of the British Parliament was introduced. The bill, therefore, has now passed both Houses of Parliament.

The Telegraph War. OMAHA, Neb., March 8.—In accordance with the order of the local and the United States courts General Superintendent Humstone, of the Atlantic and Pacific Telegraph Company, today took possession of the Atlantic and Pacific wires lately seized by the Union Pacific Railroad Company, and re-established connections. No resistance was offered on the part of the Union Pacific.

De Lesseps and His Scheme. Count Ferdinand de Lesseps held a conference with the House Select Committee on the Inter-Oceanic Ship Canal yesterday. M. de Lesseps was introduced to the committee by Chairman John D. Bayard.

Proceedings in Congress. In the Senate yesterday Mr. Harris, from the District Committee, reported a bill to increase the police force of the District by the employment of fifty men. An effort will be made to secure its early passage to meet the urgent necessity.

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POLITICS IN THE SOUTH.

The Feeling Everywhere in Favor of General Grant.

Effect of the Headquarters Movement in Virginia—Ten or Twelve County Meetings Held—All Declare for Grant—Colonel Brady's Card—A Georgia Declaration Against Secretary Sherman.

The Sheremaities say that if Colonel Brady has made a bargain with Mahone, or is "holding out for a electoral ticket," they cannot support Sherman for the nomination; as the Colonel is known and recognized to be Sherman's leader and organ in Virginia.
