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THE PORTE INSISTS.

ON LANDING MEN AT ALEXANDRIA.

Lord Dufferin Refuses—What Will Be the Result?—A Story That Arabi Asks For An Eight Day's Analytic—British Soldiers—Diers—The War.

ALEXANDRIA, AUG. 31.—Arabi has sent a Reg. of Force to General Wolsey asking that operations be suspended for eight days, with a view to the gathering of the British troops at Alexandria. General Wolsey has refused, and offers instead an armistice of one day. He reports that, but little resistance is attached to it. It is believed the British troops will be in Alexandria by the 1st of September. The Highland brigade sailed from here yesterday afternoon. The trains from Ramleh now run about two hundred yards from the coast, and the British troops are living beyond that limit are returning into the city. The enemy have retired a thousand yards further from Malakia Junction, apparently in the direction of Hamaouneh, but they continue to trenching opposite Mea. There are now about three hundred sick and wounded British troops in the hospital in Ismailia.

THE PORTS ARE CLOSED. LONDON, AUG. 31.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Constantinople says: The military advisers of the Porte continue to urge that the right to land British troops at Alexandria should be refused. Lord Dufferin, the British ambassador, refused to insert such a clause in the military convention, but consents to place on record a proviso that the English and Turkish troops may not be allowed to land until the military program in case of necessity. The Porte is disposed to agree to this, and to consent to the landing of the Turkish force at Aboukir, on the condition of an agreement between the respective governments.
